Stem and crush thoroughly about 1 1/2 cups water, stir until boiling at low heat. Add 1/2 cup water, simmer 10 minutes. Strain through a fine cloth bag, and place in a clean, covered glass jar. Measure 8 level cups (3 1/2 lbs.) sugar and 4 cups of

### Destruction of Japanese Cities

(Continued From Page One)

which caused large buildings in front of me to sway and eventually to topple. At a rough guess eighty per cent of the modern structures of the city survived the shock. But there was a different tale to tell soon afterwards when smoke began to curl up in different parts throughout the city. Within an hour fierce flames were shooting skyward.

The correspondent tells of making his escape from Tokyo in a motor car filled with men and women. Finding the car useless outside the city because the roads were torn up and the bridges gone the correspondent made his way to Yokohama on foot. He found that the villages had the same terrifying experiences as Tokio.

After sleeping on the platform of a suburban railway station, except when interrupted by shocks the correspondent proceeded to Yokohama to find a steamer.

He passed another long stream of Japanese refugees, the men in tin cans, "similar to those with whom I trudged on the previous day. They were foodless many almost without clothes, staring hopelessly and wearing dumb expressions, all seeking shelter from the inferno. Coming into the heart of Yokohama I beheld a scene more tragic than anything I had witnessed.

"The sanitary department were piling up many hundreds of dead on both sides of the streets; a dying mother clinging to her baby was lying in the gutter; ambulances were hastily removing the dying and injured who lay thick in all directions.

Aboard Canadian Ship

"On board the steamer I found a scene of great confusion. Women were sobbing, children were groaning, but some people were calming, helping them, and endeavoring to relieve the sufferings of the injured and many lives were saved by this kindly help. The vessel was the Empress of Canada. Many refugees had arrived aboard with rags tied around their feet. Men were without shoes, women without stockings, their dresses in shreds. But nearly all were bearing up bravely; they even enjoyed a little laughter over the grotesque garb in which they had escaped, notwithstanding that some of these passengers were penniless, though wealthy the day before.

"As we started along the coast we saw fresh fires spring up in the distance; burning oil blazed, sending clouds of smoke and flames skyward while the cries of foodless natives wandering along the shore could be heard.

"Before our ship reached harbor late in the afternoon it slowed down, while a casket bearing the remains of an infant who had died of exposure was lowered over the side. Down below deck a woman who had lost all her family was raving mad."

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
