THE Summerside Crystals hockey team will play the return game with the Charlottetown Victorias in the Arena Rink on this day week, the 15th inst.

LAST night the northern lights made a brilliant display in the northern sky. Rarely have they shone so brightly. As they waved to and fro they were admired by many people out on the streets.

THE delays suffered by the winter steamers during the last few days has had a visible effect in lessening travel to this Province. Hotels have had slim attendance of guests from abroad, but the registers contained many names of visitors on Wednesday night who had come to see the skating races at the Arena Rink.

AT the Arena Rink last night between the hands of the regular skating Duffly the St. John skater went against the records made at the races in the rink on the previous evening. A SERIES of important meetings has been arranged for under the joint auspices of the Dominion Dairy Commissioner, the Prince Edward Island Department of Agriculture and Dairyman's Association of Prince Edward Island. The speakers will include: C. F. Whitley, of the Dairy Commissioner's Staff, Ottawa; a representative of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, and a representative of the Dairyman's Association of Prince Edward Island. Mr. Whitley who has charge of the Dairy Branch in the Dairy Commissioner's Office in connection with the Co-operative Testing Association, will deal primarily with the improvement of dairy herds. It is quite possible, so Mr. Ruddle, Dominion Dairy Commissioner, says, to increase the production of milk in Prince Edward Island by fifty per cent without adding to the number of cows kept, or to other expenses and \$1,000,000 to the revenue from dairying. He is a native of Brackley Point.

THE Abergweil Hockey team left by the Capes last night for St. John's Newfoundland, where they play three games next week. They connect on Saturday with the S. S. Bruce at North Sydney, and will reach Port au Basque on Monday. From there they travel by the Reid Railway across the ancient colony, to St. John's, where their games will be played on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday evenings. They hope to be home by Tuesday, the 19th the whole trip occupying about twelve days. The team is perhaps not the strongest the club could place on the ice. The majority of the senior players arrange to take their holidays during the summer months; only three of them, strange for the winter holiday and consequently only three senior men were able to accompany the team. McMillan, the "Cover Point" accompanied the team, but as he too has not fully recovered from the effects of his Summerside experience, it is doubtful if he will be able to play in the game. The team will be badly handicapped without these two players, G. H. Cullen and Moran were also unable to go. The players who compose the party are L. B. McMillan, Secretary of the Club, J. Gurnley, C. Bait, J. Marnaghan, J. Peters, W. Matheson, J. A. McMillan, and J. Bell. An ex-Abergweil player may join the team at Antigonish. Marnaghan, Peters, Bell and Matheson are intermediate players, but they have been doing excellent work in practice, and should make a good showing.
