

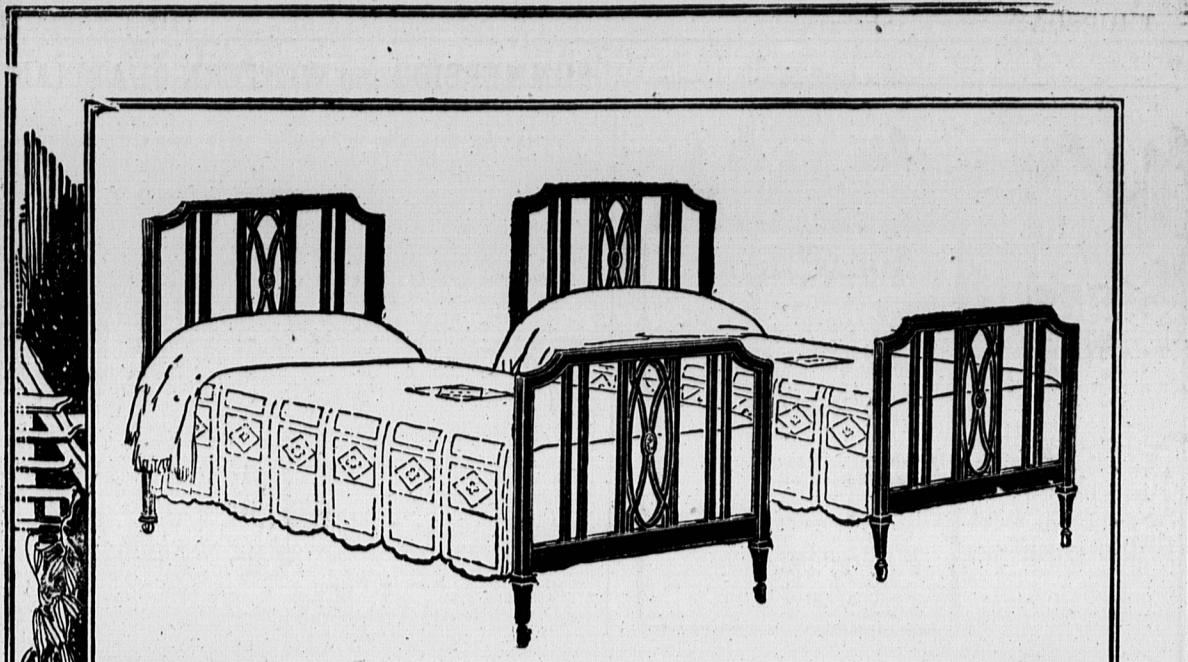

 OF 1852 STILL YOUNG
 ON 73RD BIRTHDAY**

Mrs. Cordelia Howard MacDonald Recalls Distinctly First Dramatization of Harriet Beecher Stowe's "Uncle Tom's Cabin" Sixty-nine Years Ago in Museum at Troy.

BOSTON, Sept. 20.—Mrs. Cordelia Howard MacDonald, the original "Little Eva" of the first dramatic production of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" has just had a birthday at her home in Cambridge. Mrs. MacDonald is 73. She made her debut as "Little Eva" at 4 at the Museum, Troy, N. Y., on September 27, 1852. Her father, George C. Howard then manager of the Museum, was instrumental in having "Uncle Tom's Cabin" dramatized, and gave the first performance in his theatre, taking a part himself, that of "St. Clair," the Southern planter. It is said, too, that the play was dramatized to display the abilities of little Cordelia, which were marked

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KILLED IN MISTAKE FOR MOOSE NEAR ST. MARTINS

Haliburton Brown Falls as Two Rifles Crack at Supposed Sound of Animal in Woods Near St. Martins—Death Before Help Reaches Him.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 19.—The first fatality to mark the big game hunting season in New Brunswick occurred early on Friday morning when Haliburton Brown, aged 20, son of Wilfred Brown on St. Martin's died within an hour after he had been shot in a mistake for a moose in the woods about two miles from St. Martin's. The lad expired before he was brought out to the village or before a doctor could arrive on the scene. John Holland and Graydon Gilchrist, both of St. Martin's and the latter a brother-in-law of the dead man, both fired in the direction of Brown but which of the two rifle bullets struck him causing his death has not been ascertained.

The funeral held in St. Martin's Sunday was one of the largest ever seen in the district. According to the evidence at the inquest, Brown together with Frederick Ross and Clifton McDonough all of St. Martin's, were in one party in the woods, Brown carrying a rifle. John Holland and Graydon Gilchrist were likewise shooting, each of them having a rifle. The two parties were together and no one in either party had a license to hunt big game. Holland and Gilchrist both swore that previous to the time of firing they heard what they described as unmistakable calls of a moose. Later they heard something coming through the woods and concluded it was a moose. One of the men fired at what he thought was the moose's hindquarters. They fired about the same time. One of the bullets struck Brown in the abdomen and as a result of the hemorrhage and shock the young man died soon afterwards.

THE ANGLICANS OF CANADA TO MEET EARLY IN OCTOBER

TORONTO, Sept. 19.—As a result of the fact that Hamilton has been designated as the meeting place of the general synod of the Church of England in Canada on October 5, Toronto has been selected as the meeting place of the various boards and executive committees which convene to prepare reports and arrange the business of their departments in preparation for action by the synod.

with the movement for complete independence of the Canadian society from all outside assistance. The House of Bishops convene in St. Alban's Cathedral on September 26 and 27. Chief among the subjects to be considered is the relation to and possible action of the Canadian church of the Lambeth Appeal. Then follows a conference of the missionary bishops on the 28th, at which details for the new features of the mission work in the northwest will be arranged. Important questions relating to the social service activities of the church will be considered at the annual meeting of the council for service in St. James parish hall on October 3. These include such subjects as marriage and divorce, and the relation of the moving picture to child welfare.
