The Old Gardner Says

Many garden makers have never eaten Brussels sprouts. They are among the most palatable of all garden vegetables. In appearance they resemble miniature cabbages. The resemblance to cabbages extends to the flavor as well, although it is very mild. If you want to try some this year, buy started plants and set them out in rows two feet apart. Be sure that the rows do not dry out and plant them when the ground is as rich as it can be made. A little nitrate of soda or bone meal sutured into the soil, after the plants have been set will help to push them along. You may have to fight cabbage worms, but they are not difficult to combat.

Shipping News

A REMARKABLE ISLAND White Island, which lies in the Bay of Plenty, on the coast of New Zealand, derives its name from the clouds of white steam which it appears to be continually enveloped. Its area is only 600 acres and its height about 800 feet above the sea level. The water of the island is of a pale green hue, and anything dipped into it becomes of a red brick color. The fumes of sulphur are always plainly perceptible. Covering an area of fifty acres of one of the lakes on the island is an immense cauldron hissing and snorting and sending forth volumes of poisonous steam, while all chances of egress appear to be denied by the steep, silent and gloomy cliffs.

HARDNESS OF ICEBERG The hardness and strength of ice increases with the degree of cold, and as icebergs come from the region of perpetual cold of an intensity difficult to realize it is readily seen how they can become "demons of destruction." The hardness of icebergs is something wonderful, even surpassing that of the "land ice" reported from St. Petersburg in 1740, wherein it is declared that "in the severe winter of that year a house was built of ice taken from the river Neva which was fifty feet long, sixteen feet wide and twenty feet high, and the walls supported the roof, which was also of ice. Before it stood two ice mortars and six ice cannon made on a turning lathe, with carriages and wheels also of ice. The cannon were of the calibre of six pounds, but they were loaded only with one-quarter pound of powder and with hemp balls—one one ounce of the ice was only four inches, and yet it resisted the explosion."

HOMELY WRINKLES Paint can be removed from the hands by rubbing the hands with kerosene.

Kitchen walls should be painted or calcolmined, rather than papered, a cheerful buff is a good color. Another plan is to sheath the walls, giving a good washable surface.

Liberal use of green stuff, such as lettuce, celery, onions, cabbage, and of the fresh fruits available, is the best single preventive of that "spring feeling" that we call "spring fever." Some fresh fruits and vegetables should have a place in the meal plans of every day. The winter diet has meant curtailed use of dairy products and eggs and of bulky fruits and vegetables. Alternate use of these foods keeps the blood as it ought to be and the whole body in tonic condition. Take your spring tonic through your diet.

HOW COOKING MAY DETERMINE RELATIVE ECONOMY Our war experience has taught us a new conception of the word "economy"—we think of it not as niggardly hoarding but as wise use. So our economy maxims might read— Seasonableness Means Serviceableness—In other words let us not buy fresh peas or asparagus in January, but let us in June can our summer vegetables for January use.

"Soggy" or Underdone Vegetables—are "wasted" as they tax digestion and do not give proper nourishment. Careful Cooking of Vegetables May Save Meat—Since the flavor of a small quantity of meat may be "extended" by using nicely cooked vegetables as a basis for various attractive dishes.
