AMERICA'S CUP DEFENDER

To the People of Prince Edward Island

(Continued.)

How is it that so many people who have accumulated money through the profits of their business and by saving from their incomes a certain amount yearly, show such poor judgment when it comes to investing money? The experience of the last three or four years has shown how unsafe it is for the ordinary business or professional man to engage in speculation of any kind. 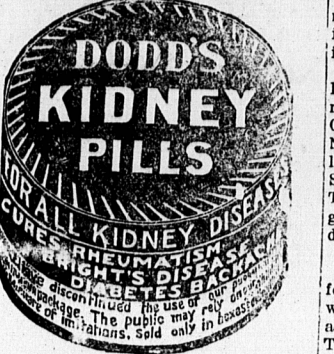
