TRAIN OF GASOLINE TANK CARS COMING HERE

OTTAWA, September 24.—A solid
train of gasoline tank cars is speed-
ing in the direction of the Maritime
Provinces in order to prevent a tie-
up of Nova Scotia and New Brun-
swick fishing boats, owing to a gas-
oline shortage. Appeal to the food
controller was made by wire by H. B.
Short, of the Canadian Fisheries As-
sociation, at Digby.

Enquiry was made of the oil com-
panies with tanks of oil—over 150,
000 gallons—which were en route
from New Jersey, to be banded to
the Grand Trunk Railway for move-
ment over the Canadian government
railway to Halifax and St. John. As a
result of an appeal to Mr. Harold, su-
perintendent of transportation for the
Grand Trunk railway, and Mr. Hayes,
general manager of the Canadian
government railways, seventeen cars
received from the American railways
have been turned over by the Grand
Trunk railway to the Canadian gov-
ernment railways.

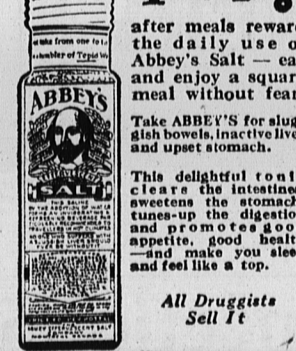
