Veterans Become Chefs And Bakers At Trades School

TORONTO, March 5. (CP) - Any day now the Home, Restaurant and Bakery Trades School at the Toronto Training and Re-establishment Centre will be sending out its first graduates to take their places in hotels and restaurants throughout the country.

Run by the Department of Veterans Affairs for former service men and women, the school is the only one of its kind in Canada. While it gives preference to Ontario veterans, nevertheless service personnel from other parts of Canada are accepted on a quota basis.

"With the exception of British Columbia and Quebec we have representatives from every province in Canada," said Mr. G. A. Dobson, director of the school. Formerly from Saskatoon, Mr. Dobson at one time headed Canada's only training school for maids which was run several years ago by the Saskatchewan government under its youth training plan.

Already 84 students are attending the cooking school which opened in August. Only six of this total are women. The course, which lasts from six to nine months, includes classes in baking, pastry making and kitchen supervision.

Just now the school is suffering in much the same manner as the average Canadian household - no sugar! It is under the same rationing provisions as made for restaurants across Canada and has 4,300 customers flocking daily to its adjoining lunch-room and tuck shop. They too are war veterans taking other courses at the centre and all of them are willing guinea pigs when it comes to sampling the delicacies the student cooks are turning out.

Jobs? Mrs. Dobson said she has received an average of two or three letters daily from hotel, restaurant and resort operators anxious to hire her pupils as soon as they have completed their courses. Many requests have come from owners of summer resorts looking for cooks and chefs for the holiday months. "I think however most of the students will prefer steady year-round employment," said Mrs. Dobson.

Place For Home Recipe

Even mother's secret recipes have slipped into the cookery curriculum. Bruce Hollingshead, Hamilton, Ont., formerly with the Royal Canadian Navy and now on the way to becoming a chef, brought his mother's sweet potato recipe to school. And now the Hollingshead "special" often tops the lunch-room menu.

Artie of the group is George Churchill, Kelvington, Sask., an army veteran with a flare for turning out a picture-plate salad. George's parents formerly operated a restaurant in Saskatchewan and he plans to follow in their footsteps.

Tim Buck's Views On Espionage Probe

TORONTO, March 5. (CP) - Tim Buck, national leader of the Labor-Progressive Party, said in a statement today that the interim report of the Commission appointed by the Dominion Government to inquire into espionage in Canada, "is directed primarily to inflaming anti-Soviet prejudice."

"However before the government of a modern state utilized evidence of espionage activities in such a provocative manner against an ally," said the statement by Buck, former leader of the Communist Party in Canada who was named head of the Labor-Progressive Party after it was organized in 1943.

"The report names members of the official staff of the Soviet Embassy in Ottawa and, as though to make it impossible for the Soviet Government to ignore that provocation, it declares that espionage was carried on 'under direct instructions from Moscow.'"

Two features of the report add to "the accumulating evidence that the secret investigation is but the backdrop of a planned offensive against the growth of friendship and co-operation" between Canada and the Soviet.

One was the character of the information the report described as secret: "It is a tragic thing that in a war for national survival Canada should have kept such information secret from an ally who suffered most and bore the main brunt of the struggle against Hitler's armies." This implied an attempt to represent the Soviet an ally in war, as an enemy in the post-war world.

"The second feature is the fact that the report reveals that the King Government has also been directing systematic espionage upon the social and capitalist sectors of the world. Progressive Canadians could defeat the 'enemies of cooperation' by pressing for public action demanding that the 'present vicious campaign of anti-Soviet provocation be stopped.'"
