**Hoover Sees Gifts Impairing U. S. Position**

NEW YORK, June 15 — (AP) — Herbert Hoover said today that the United States could not continue for long its foreign gifts program without impairing its production.  
"The greatest danger to all civilization is for us to impair our economy by economic drains which cripple our own productivity. Unless this one remaining Gibraltar of economic strength is maintained, chaos will be inevitable over the whole world."  
In a letter to chairman Styles Bridges (Rep.-N.H.) of the Senate appropriations committee, Hoover said the United States now probably was a debtor rather than creditor nation and that

gifts and loans overseas had caused the country to over-export. "These gifts are an immediate burden on the taxpayer," he wrote. "The goods furnished under loans also must be paid for immediately while the repayment is deferred for years."  
"This has a bearing upon our tax burdens. Including local government expenditures, they now amount to about 35 per cent of our national income. No free nation can continue at that for long without impairing its productivity."  
Hoover again placed blame for delays in world reconstruction on Soviet Russia as he did in a letter to chairman John Taber (Rep.-N.Y.) of the House of Representatives appropriations committee last month.  
"The obstruction of the Soviet Government to peace has, during the last two years, imposed billions in expenditures upon us through support of occupation armies and relief to a starvation which would not otherwise have been required. However, we can apparently expect little co-operation from that quarter."  
Hoover gave implied endorsement to the Truman doctrine by stating "we should concentrate our limited resources in the areas in which western civilization can be preserved."

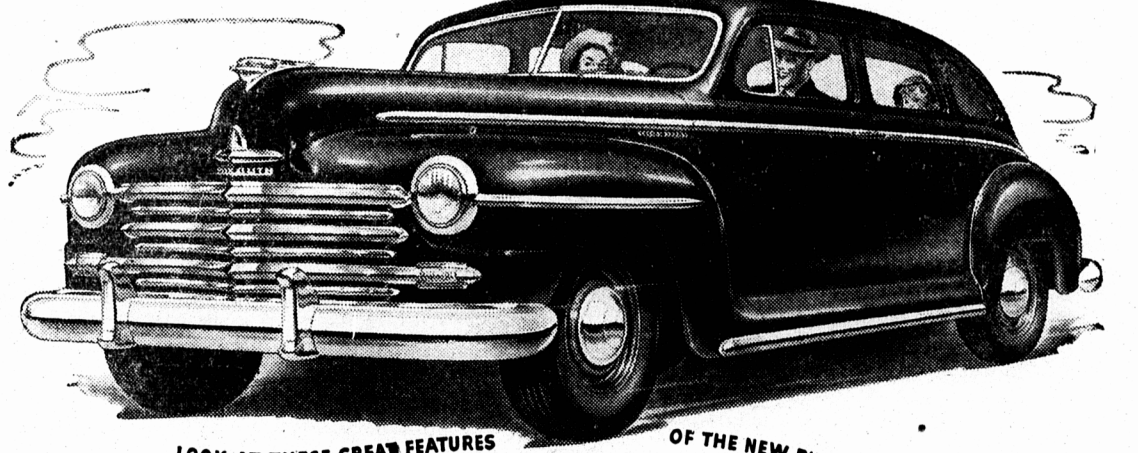

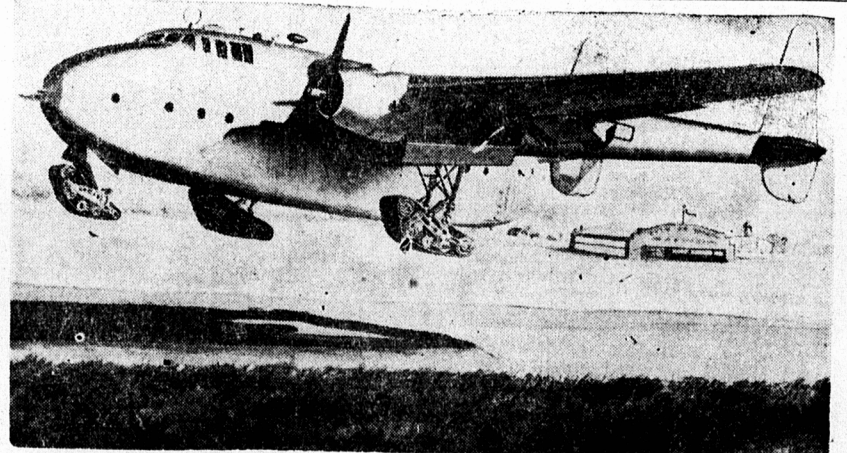

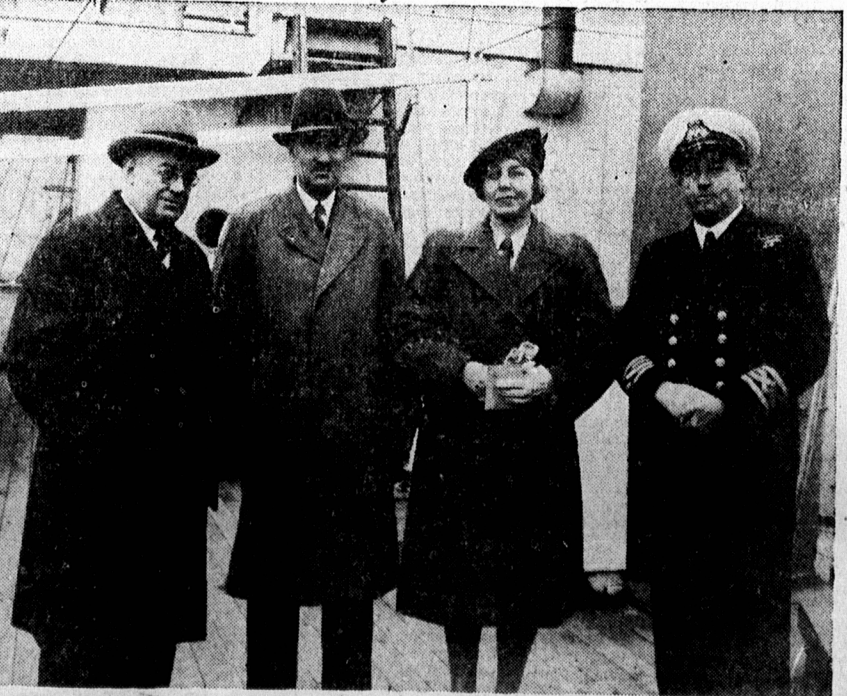
