FIFTY THOUSAND OF BULGARIANS

Are Massacred and the Macedonian Forests

Are Filled with Refugees. The Woods are Fired to Drive them Out. Reprisals in Kind are Threatened.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Sept. 8.—The Macedonian interior organization estimates that 150,000 women, children and old men are hiding in the mountains and forests of Macedonia. The Turks are burning the forests in the districts of Lerin and Kestur, and killing fugitives who attempt to escape to the plains. The Vlach village of Gopesh, three hours distant from Monastir, has been burned by the Turks, who are reported to have thrown several of the inhabitants into the fire. The Bashi-Bazouks have destroyed the village of Stollbo, near Malkoternovo. Thirteen thousand Turkish soldiers are assembled on the frontier at Palanka, Kratovo and Goshani, and are plundering the surrounding villages. Famine prevails in the district of Krushovo and the population is going into the adjacent districts. All reports from the vilayet of Monastir agree in describing the situation as appalling. Between 30,000 and 50,000 Bulgarian inhabitants are believed to have been massacred by the Turks and every Bulgarian village in the vilayet has been destroyed. The refugees in the mountains are dying of starvation by the thousands. It is impossible to obtain precise figures. The revolutionary headquarters estimate that 50,000 Bulgarian men, women and children have been killed, while at least the same number of refugees are slowly perishing of hunger. In official circles these figures are regarded as an underestimate and officials incline to the belief that the number of the massacred exceeds 50,000. The Turks are apparently determined to exterminate the entire Bulgarian population of the vilayet.

The government, aware of the situation is viewed with increasing alarm. It is reliably reported that the Turkish forces in Macedonia number 300,000. It is considered impossible that such a force has been assembled merely to crush the rebellion. It is feared that the Sultan is meditating an attack on Bulgaria. LONDON, Sept. 9.—A Sofia despatch to the Daily Mail dated September 8, says the revolutionary committee seems about to spring a new series of surprises on the Turks, for to-morrow it will issue to the representatives of the powers a circular note forwarding them of coming events. The note is intended to justify the future actions of the insurgents and will point to the probable total extermination of the Christians as necessitating the employment of the same atrocious measures by the revolutionaries against the Turks and will contend that the responsibility for such desperate acts will rest with the powers. Everything seems to point to new and terrible developments in Macedonia. On top of the appalling accounts of the results of the Turkish methods of "restoring order" in the vilayet of Monastir come the threat by the insurgents to resort to reprisals on the same scale. The ports anxiety to suppress news by expelling newspaper correspondents from the area of operations is held to have but one meaning. This morning's papers comment upon the significance of the news, first published by The Associated Press that Russia and Austria are seeking to persuade the powers to coerce Bulgaria as showing a belief that war is inevitable. No further news regarding the outbreak at Beirut has reached here. A despatch to the Standard from Constantinople, dated Sunday, says: "The Turks are much disturbed by the presence of American warships at Beirut and are making every effort to have them recalled. In spite of all assertions that the United States intends them to be there only for the simple protection of the rights of her citizens, it is quite possible that the despatch of the warships may initiate action leading much further."

The same correspondent, telegraphing under Monday's date on receipt of news of the Beirut outbreak says: "With the slightest encouragement disorders might result in the whole of Lebanon rising in revolt."
