At 7.30 Brother Allan Strang took the chair and gave a brief history of the division. Recitations, dialogues, vocal and instrumental music followed. Every member on the program was responded to. The instrumental music violin and organ by J. Dalton and Miss Winnie Thomas was much enjoyed. The pies were auctioned by Bro. J. J. England of Helping Hand Division and by singing God Save the King, an enjoyable evening was brought to a close. Our teacher S. W. Currie is pleased to find his efforts appreciated, hence the increased attendance at school. Philip Crossman's saw mill is again in working order. All the gristmills in this part of the country are unable to keep up with their work owing to scarcity of water.

ST. LOUIS EXPOSITION.

THE I. C. R. is distributing very interesting literature in connection with the St. Louis Exposition to open May 1st next. The World's Fair of 1904 occupies 1240 acres. What this means in magnitude of grounds is best shown by comparison. The World's Columbian Exposition at Chicago embraced 633 acres. The Exposition of 1904 at Paris occupied 336 acres; the Pan-American at Buffalo had 300 acres; the Centennial at Philadelphia, 238 acres, and the Trans-Mississippi at Omaha, 150. There is embraced within the limits of the World's Fair of 1904 at St. Louis acreage almost equalling the aggregate of the Columbian Exposition, the Centennial, the Pan-American and the Trans-Mississippi. Immensity is not the strongest claim to public interest. It is important chiefly in its bearing upon the distinctive plan and scope of this latest and greatest of universal expositions. This is an exposition of processes rather than of products. The living, moving, operative exhibits take more floor space, more room out of doors than the still exposition. The greater buildings, the increased acreage, permit practical operation, which would be impossible with restricted area. The main exhibit palaces at St. Louis have under roof 128 acres. These at Chicago covered 82 acres; at Buffalo, 15 acres, and at Omaha 9 acres. Until the Universal Exposition at Saint Louis outdoor exhibits cut very little figure. At St. Louis there are 109 acres of these outside exhibits, some of which rival in popular interest the indoor displays. A single building at St. Louis contains more exhibit space than there was in the entire Pan-American Exposition. The largest exhibit palace ever erected for a single department of an exposition is the Palace of Agriculture at St. Louis. The first exposition building ever set apart for education is the Palace of Education at St. Louis. To the classes of exhibits which were shown in the great Liberal Arts building at Chicago, this Exposition devotes four of its main exhibit palaces containing over twice the floor space of the Chicago building. These comparative statements are preliminary to details of the characteristic features of the exhibits at St. Louis circulars can be had on application at the effect of the superintendent of the P. F. I. R.
