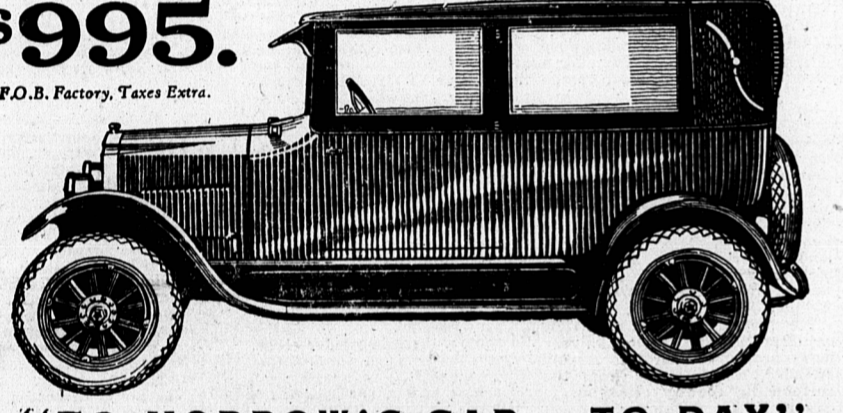

 Sirs,—I beg to submit the yearly report of the House Committee. The following is a list of the general repairs and improvements to our building during the past year. The roof was given a thorough overhauling and repairs completed where necessary. Five new water-spouts were installed and four new drip stones in front of the building. Our outside walls were repainted and repairs made on the corners.

All broken glass renewed and sashes put in good repair. New window-guards and back-boards installed in the gymnasium. Four folding doors installed in the board room.

The old dressing room in the basement repaired and put in first class condition for a play room for the boys.

New dressing and shower room built over the cellar to give added accommodation to our members.

The foundation in the cellar was repaired and renewed in many places.

A new concrete floor was laid around our furnace and enlarged to give ample working space.

Our electric wiring in the basement which had never been put in good order was completely overhauled, renewed and repaired, and is now in very good condition.

A great deal of work was done on our shower baths and the change was a welcome one. There is, however, considerable more work to be done before your committee will be satisfied.

Your House Committee has at all times tried to keep the building in a good state of repair. We are hampered in this somewhat by the lack of necessary funds, but it is our aim to keep on trying, and we hope before long to have many more necessary repairs attended to.

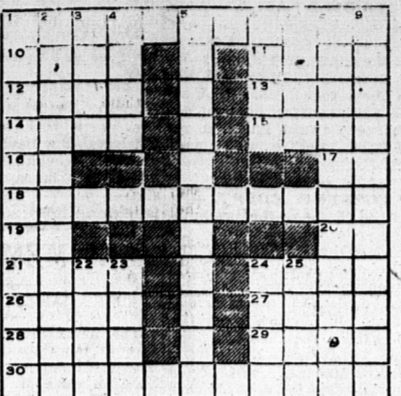
The receipts from our two old alleys have increased a great deal over last year as our financial statement shows.

Of Importance To Canada

LONDON, May 13.—The majority report of the Geddes food commission has three features of outstanding importance to Canadian interests.

The first recommends a close watch on the operations of Argentine meat companies, with the possibility of acquisition or government control at the British end if these companies are found to exercise an adverse control on the British markets. Canadians have many times claimed the possibility of encouraging the flow of food stuff to Britain.

The third feature is that while no wheat exploitation has been found the report states that the British port charges are unjustifiably high on wheat and a way must be found to reduce these charges.

The report gives the following increases: Glasgow, 100 per cent above the pre-war level and London \$7 per cent.

There was no evidence of international control of the wheat trade by "rings."

Mr. Pendleton then spoke on the coming financial campaign, which he said was the only means of extending the "v" privileges at a reasonable low rate. Without its aid there were about 200 boys in the city who would be deprived of these privileges. Sixty-nine years ago, townsmen had had enough vision to erect the present building—the oldest Y.M.C.A. premises in North America. The time was almost here when those in charge should be thinking of enlarging the property to meet present day needs. This could not be done without the financial co-operation of the people. Speaking of the great deficit of about \$3,000, he said he hoped to see that wiped out in the near future.

Mr. R. H. Jenkins, seconded by Mr. J. H. Williams, moved a vote of thanks to the Press for the publicity it had given the work of the Association. It was responded to by Mr. C. H. Mitchell, of the Patriot.

The meeting closed with prayer by Mr. R. H. Jenkins.

RENO, Nev., May 13.—Accused of treating federal prisoners sent to the Fulton county jail as his guests, Sheriff J. B. Crane was fined \$500 in federal court at Carson City yesterday. The sheriff was alleged to have permitted his prisoners to attend motion pictures alone at night and to enjoy the freedom of the grounds outside the jail.
