

Black Hawks Gives Rangers 2-1 Beating

NEW YORK, Feb. 29 (AP)—The "hot" Chicago Black Hawks, backed by the fine goal tending of Paul Goodman, gave the Rangers a 2-1 beating before 9,000 fans here tonight and pulled the New Yorkers down into a tie for the National Hockey League leadership with Boston Bruins, who have two games in hand.

A late second-period goal by Mush March, culminating a pretty play by Bill Carse who faked the Ranger defence out of position, sent the Rangers down to their sixth defeat in the last 11 games. The Hawks have been beaten only once in 11 outings.

They were never behind tonight. Bill Thomson giving them the lead in the first period with a 30-foot shot past Dave Kerr and March winning the game after Neil Colville tied the score earlier in the second period.

With a glorious chance of copping the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Intercollegiate Hockey title within their reach Father Oswald Murphy's red and white shirted crew from Saint Dunstan's University wound up their training yesterday for tonight's crucial engagement with Mt. Allison University at the Forum.

Never in the history of the Island institution of learning has such a state of excitement prevailed as does today at S. D. U. Every single student just oozes confidence plus that their squad will mark a new page in Island hockey history tonight by whipping the garnet and gold of Mt. A. to qualify for the Maritime final against the Nova Scotia winners. The team itself says very little but there is a grim determination evident in each member that they are ready to put up the battle of their lives in an effort to be returned the winners.

Practice sessions since their winning effort against U. N. B. just one week ago tonight have been fast skating, hard dumping affairs that has left the squad in the pink of condition for the fray and ready to counteract anything the visitors may show with fast attacks of their own. Saints are pepped up for this game as they have never before and Les Lowther's Mt. Allison warriors are in for just as tough a hockey season as the local University can make for them.

The old college spirit was at its peak last night throughout the corridors and rooms of old S. D. U. and students will be at the Forum tonight 100 per cent strong to lend their ear-splitting vocal support to the efforts the ten players on the ice will be putting forth.

The game is a natural from every angle. Two teams riding the crest of winning streaks meet in a crucial contest; both have scoring punch and both can lay it on with heavy bumping when the occasions warrant and capping it all will be the basis of speed that will occur from the opening whistle until the final one has blown. It appears as if the game will be one of the fastest, closest and hardest fought encounters ever to take place in the Forum. Both squads are out seeking a victory at any cost and if dogged, hard-working efforts can accomplish their purpose then both teams have an equal chance of being crowned the victors. It should be a battle all the way and it would not be surprising if one of the breaks that so often appear in a hockey game would be the deciding factor in the struggle.

Judging from the records of both squads it looks like a matter of taking your choice in picking the winner. Saints are in the drivers' seat but only by a narrow margin and whether or not they retain it will be decided on tonight's encounter.

Canadiens See Chance At Playoffs Slip As Bruins Win 4-2

MONTREAL, Feb. 29 (CP)—Boston Bruins practically sounded the death knell to Canadiens' chances of reaching the Stanley Cup playoffs tonight when they defeated the Montrealers 4-2 in a National Hockey League game. It was Canadiens' sixth straight defeat and left them without a victory at home since Dec. 14.

Lightning came in front of the brilliant network of Mike Karakas, the Habitués kept in the running for two periods but faded in the last session as the spectacular Kraut line of Milt Schmidt, Woody Dumart and Bobby Bauer combined to send the Bruins in as victors.

With the score tied 2-2, on tallies by Tony Demers and Lou Trudel for Canadiens and by Du Clapper and Roy Conacher for the Bruins, Dumart and Schmidt put the game away with scores in the second half of the last period. Dumart's score came on a great solo rush while Schmidt whipped home a backhander after taking passes from his linemates.

The loss just about meant elimination of Canadiens from a playoff berth for they are five points behind the sixth-place New York Americans.

Armstrong In Top Form For Fight

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 29 (AP)—Welterweight champion Henry Armstrong, the nearest thing to perpetual motion the ring has seen, apparently is in top shape to attempt a feat never recorded in prize-fight history.

Once ruler of three divisions, now the king of the world's 147-pound ranks, he is confident he will annex a fourth title tomorrow night against heavier, hard-hitting Ceferno Garcia, claimant of the middleweight crown.

The Filipino's title may be a clouded one, and a victory by Armstrong would further befuddle the situation, but there will be action, excitement and drama in this battle.

In 1938 these two waged a furious 15-round struggle in New York, with Armstrong successfully defending his welterweight championship.

His natural weight finds Garcia at his natural weight and defending the crown he blasted away from Freddie Apostoli in New York last October.

Torchlight Parade Set For Tonight

In the throes of hockey fever, Saint Dunstan's students last night came through with a victory by Forum as they anxiously awaited the opening whistle that would send both teams into action.
