The train arrived last night at 10 o'clock. Mrs. BENJ. ROGERS, returned to the city last night.

P. G. LESLIE, Souris Line Road, arrived Wednesday night from Coupen, Saskatchewan, where he has been engaged in farming for the past five years.

News is received that Miss Mary McDonald, daughter of J. B. McDonald of this city, has successfully passed her preliminary examinations, preparatory to taking a three years' course in Carney Hospital, Boston.

The prices for Dean Southwick's Recital on Thursday night next have been placed at the low rate of 25, 35, and 50 cents. This will give all an opportunity to hear the great Shakespearean interpreter. The plan will open Monday morning in the usual places.

A FOOTBALL match between the "Baskers" and Prince of Wales College teams will be played at the C. A. A. grounds tomorrow afternoon at 3.30 o'clock. This was to have been played three weeks ago but was postponed because of the inclement weather.

The Halifax Herald, in speaking of Dean Southwick, who appears in the Opera House next Tuesday night says: "The speaker held his audience spell bound. His personality resembles Sir Henry Irving's and the serious beauty of his work also suggests the greatest interpreter of the great matter."

By error The Guardian stated yesterday that both the ship Sorinto and her cargo would be sold on Friday (to-day). It is only the ship that is to be then sold. Messrs. Hyndman & Co., have not yet received orders as to the disposal of the cargo. Tenders for the cargo of deals will be called for up to 6 o'clock p. m. Wednesday November 21st.

Last evening shortly after six o'clock, while Lee Horne, son of John Horne Winsloe, was driving up Queen Street he met two loose horses running down the Street. Mr. Horne's animal became frightened, bolted and left the wagon and occupied near Large's Livery. At the corner of Queen and Busson Streets the horse suddenly met another team and in turning quick, the horse stumbled and fell, making things lively for awhile. Fortunately neither driver nor horse was seriously hurt. Mr. Horne had some trouble in finding his harness, on account of the darkness.

At a meeting held in the City Council Chamber last evening in the interest of pure elections there was an attendance of about twenty-five citizens including Dr. J. T. Jenkins, Alexander Martin, M. P., J. A. Mathieson, M. L. A., Mayor Paton, Councillors Stewart and Reddin, Richard C. Goff was appointed chairman and R. H. Campbell secretary. On motion of Mr. Martin, M. P. seconded by Mr. McCready it was resolved that an association be formed for the purpose of promoting pure elections. After some discussion a committee of five was appointed to draft a constitution and formulate a platform of principles to report at the adjourned meeting to be held next Thursday evening in the same place. For the instruction of the committee a general discussion was had covering the ground of bribery, corrupt practices, compulsory voting and the abolition of canvassing. These subjects were discussed from various standpoints by Dr. Jenkins, Mr. Martin, M. P., Dr. McNeill, E. D. Sterna, J. D. Seaman, C. C. Gardiner, W. C. Turner, J. K. Ross, J. A. Mathieson, Mayor Paton, W. L. Cotton and others. There was great unanimity among the speakers as to the necessity of suppressing bribery and punishing both the parties to any corrupt transaction. There appeared to be a general opinion in favor of compulsory voting, although the question was raised as to what the voter should do in case he could not conscientiously vote for either of the candidates who were nominated. A much wider difference of opinion was shown in regard to the proposal to abolish canvassing, chiefly in regard to its practicability. Most of the speakers were agreed that the present practice led on to bribery and ought to be discontinued as far as practicable and a number of the speakers believed it to be practicable. Emphasis was a feature of the meeting and there seemed a determination among those present to extend the organization into every constituency and polling division and make its influence felt in the elections of the future. The committee will meet in the City Building on Monday evening next to draft a constitution and propose a name for the organization, to be submitted at the adjourned meeting on Thursday following.

A number of addresses were delivered, that of Rev. G. R. White, being particularly good. The program also included recitations, reading and solos, all most enjoyable. There was a successful sale of candy and the meeting was marked by that good-fellowship which is characteristic of the Division.

In the Court of Appeal in Equity the argument in the case of Tanton vs. The City Councillors was concluded yesterday at 4 o'clock, McQuarrie finishing with this reply. He concluded by referring to recent decisions in his favor in five of the provinces of Canada, and the decisions of the Privy Council of England, which came down a few days ago upholding the case of the Christian Brothers, decided in Ontario without the intervention of the Attorney-Generals. The court adjourned to give judgment on a future day to be named.

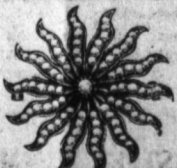
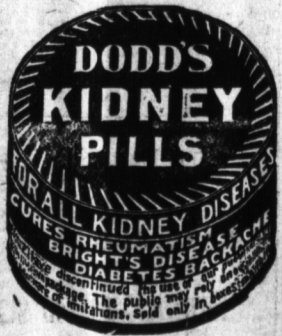

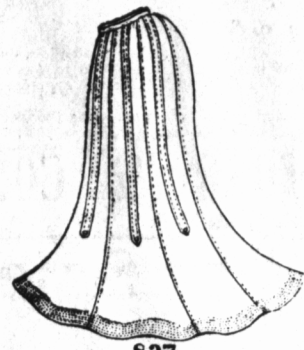
