**THE PARDON OF ARABI.**

Twenty years ago Arabi Pasba was the greatest enemy of Britain and led a revolt in Egypt. The insurrection cost the lives of some brave Englishmen but Arabi was signally defeated by Lord Wolseley at Tel-el-Kebir. The rebel chief was captured at Cairo and exiled to Ceylon. There he has lived since 1882 and had been almost forgotten when he recently made a pathetic appeal for pardon. "Tell the English people" he said "that I am an old man—old before my time. Tell them that I am broken down in health, unfit for anything but reflection on the past, in capable of dishonesty, or dishonor. I want to die among my own people. I want to see Egypt and those I love before the last hour comes. If the English Government would allow me to go back to Egypt, I should go, not as an enemy but as the friend of England."

The prisoner's sincere and manly prayer was quickly answered. Ten days ago he was set at liberty and given transport back to the land of his birth. He was born about 1837. His courage and ability are on all sides admitted. Apparently no one doubts the sincerity of his present submission. He comes back to a new Egypt, greatly changed since the time when he was sent into exile. He will find the land with its people liberated from bondage, its taxation lightened, its cultivable area greatly extended and its productiveness increased; he will find the Soudan reconquered, vast works of public utility being constructed, and everywhere a grateful people recognizing the benefits of British occupation. It is doubtless well that Arabi should come back and see all this for himself, and when he sees it he may become doubly "the friend of England."

Yesterday's morning announced the birth of three pairs of twins, and four of the new arrivals were boys. This is rather a boisterous beginning for June.

It seems now to be settled that there will be no election in West Queens until after Sir Louis Davies returns from England. This will give ample time for the electors to think over the matter of selecting his successor as a representative in Parliament. A goodly number have already indicated their preference however quite in accord with a suggestion made in these columns.

A correspondent wants to know why it is that when we elect a man to the City Council he immediately aspires to the Legislature, and when that ambition is gratified he forthwith thinks himself the right man for the Commons. We give it up. But Shakespeare tells us of "a vaulting ambition which overleaps itself and falls on the other side." There are still some cases of that kind.

It would appear from Rev. Mr. Jones' lecture that the Ten Tribes long ago came to Europe. Now if they are not in the British Isles where are they? Certain it is that throughout the Anglo-Saxon world there are more copies of the Hebrew Scriptures than in all the world besides. Why are we singing the Psalms of David with a mixed feeling of devotion and patriotism, just as the Hebrews did, if there is not some racial connection? And then there is that Stone of Destiny in the coronation chair, on which kings of Ireland, of Scotland, and more recently kings and queens of the Three Kingdoms have been crowned. What does it all mean?

But whether there are six, nine, fifteen, or sixteen they ought to be rooted out. "The fair name of Souris" will be fairer for having the prosecutor's attention called thereto and his duty done connection with the matter.

The Examiner thinks there is nothing immoral or discreditable about its saying that no sane man would expect the former liquor sellers to obey the prohibitory law. We notice that in the same issue it prints a letter stating that there are six saloons in Souris, all of which "are kept in a decent and respectable manner." The correspondent adds: "The Inspector was around quite lately and of those six, four were fined \$50 and costs." Putting that and that together all can see The Examiner's idea of what is "decent and respectable." There are others who do not think it particularly respectable to sell liquor at any time or place for consumption as a beverage. There are still more who do not think it either decent or respectable to sell in violation of the law. Besides the Canada Temperance Act is known to be quite constitutional.
