NaziFlyerGoes to Peru

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—Attorney General Robert Jackson announced today that Franz Von Werra, German war flyer who escaped a Canadian prison train, had fled the United States while under \$10,000 bond and apparently had gone to Peru.

Declaring that Von Werra's flight while his case was under consideration "constitutes a flagrant abuse of neutral hospitality which had been invoked on his behalf," Jackson ordered a tightening of treatment in all similar cases.

He sent these instructions to States attorneys:

1. Any escaping prisoner of war must be turned back at the United States borders with whatever force is reasonably necessary.

2. Any escaped prisoner of war entering the United States must be held for instruction from the attorney general.

3. In no case may immigration authorities or United States attorneys agree to release such a prisoner in the custody of consular officers.

Von Werra had fled to the United States after his release in Canada.

The 28-year-old German airman was arrested at Ogdensburg, N. Y., Jan. 25 after his spectacular flight in sub-zero weather. He said he had paddled a boat with his hands through a channel of ice of the St.

Lawrence River.

He declared at New York after the German consulate had posted bond for his release that he would "find my way back to Germany as well as I found my way out of prison camps three times."

Von Werra has claimed to have shot down 14 "enemy" planes before he was brought down in England last Sept. 7, and twice escaped from prison camps in Britain before he was shipped to Canada.

Von Werra is believed to have left for South America April 8, Jackson said, adding that the justice department understood he was headed for Peru.

Jackson made it plain Von Werra's action would be considered in recommending the bond to be fixed by courts in other prisoner of war cases.

Appeals to

Australians

To stand firm

NEW YORK, April 24—(CP)—In a statement given out in London to Australian press representatives, Prime Minister R. G. Menzies today urged the Australian people to stand firm after the heavy which their soldiers fighting on Greek soil.

The text of Mr. Menzies' statement was broadcast by the British Broadcasting Corporation and picked up here at the Columbia Broadcasting System's short-wave listening station.

The broadcast quoted Mr. Menzies as follows: "At this moment, when Australian forces are both in Greece and Tobruk fighting successfully and inflicting losses on the enemy, I urge the Australian people to stand firm."

He said the difficulties of the Greek campaign were always understood by the British, Australian and New Zealand governments but it was considered unthinkable that Greece should be left unassisted.

Mr. Menzies went on: "I say quite bluntly that whatever criticism may arise in relation to assistance to Greece, it is nothing to the criticism we would have justly encountered all over the world if, having secured Greece for months and encouraged her in her epic struggle, we had then shrugged our shoulders and said that against Germany we could give her no aid and that she must fight alone."

Mr. Menzies said the expedition to Greece represented a major decision in war strategy of the highest possible order of secrecy which was the reason the Australian advisory war council was not consulted.

Even the decisions in London were confined to the war cabinet and did not extend to British ministers generally. Accordingly it was felt that information regarding the measures taken could not be given to anybody in Australia who was not a cabinet minister.

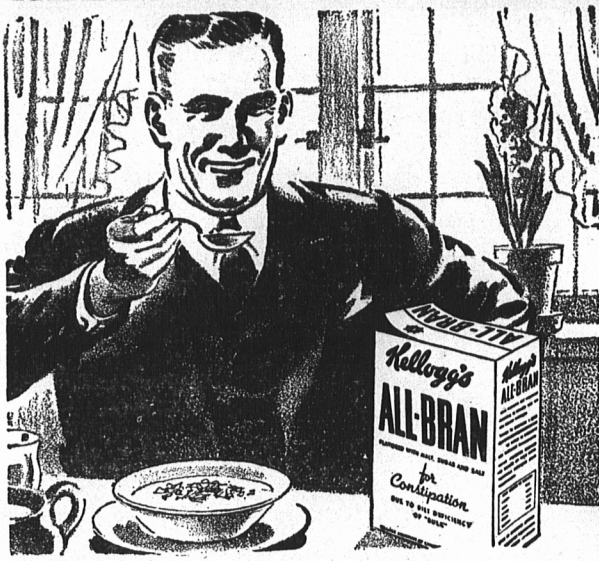
In concluding his statement, the Australian Prime Minister, whose planned departure for Canada and the United States has been delayed by the developments consequent upon the Nazi invasion of Greece and Yugoslavia, called on all parties in Australia to "close ranks."

BRITAIN'S BULLDOGS

Give the Lie to U-Boat Boats

The bulldog, national emblem of Britain, is now proving a valuable source of funds for Britain's war chest. He was one of many breeds of dogs exported from the United Kingdom last year. Over 50 were shipped abroad, their value total-

ing over £25,000. Britain, the acknowledged dog-breeding centre of the world shipped nearly all the popular breeds last year. The animals ranged in value from £10 to £1000 each, and included such dogs as the terriers—fox, bull, Cairn, Airedale and Kerry Blue—as well as pointers, setters, English springers, elkhounds, greyhounds and big dogs like the

Great Dane and mastiff. They were shipped through one of the world-famous British organizations which look after the interests of overseas dog-lovers, acting on their behalf in the selection purchase and shipment of all kinds of livestock.

Despite German boasts of U-boat sinkings only £20 was paid out by the insurance underwriters during the year for dogs lost at sea by enemy action.
