**BAPTIST WORLD'S CONVENTION**

PHILADELPHIA, June 19—On June 14th inst sixty clergymen and laymen from the Baptist Churches of Great Britain arrived on the steamer "Carmaria" from Philadelphia as delegates to the Baptist World's Alliance Convention in that city which began June 19. Twenty additional delegates came directly on the liner "Merion" to Philadelphia, from Great Britain, and the Steamer "President Lincoln" has a great Baptist delegation from other European countries. In the latter steamer are one hundred clergymen, and sixty of these have been in prison and banishment for preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ in Russia. Many of them have been in banishment in Siberia and cruelly scourged for their Baptist faith. The Baptist people of Great Britain and United States have raised a large fund to pay the expenses of these men from Russia and Roumania to the World's Alliance. During the past few years the great Baptist revival has been going on in Southern Russia and Roumania and Bulgaria. One hundred thousand people have been added to the Churches from the Greek and Catholic Churches. The "Literary Digest" said a few months ago that this was the most remarkable movement of modern times, and that it bid fair to change the face of the whole east. It was a voluntary movement. The Baptists of the United States do number any other Protestant denomination by 200,000 according to the last census; and the Baptist denomination is one of the largest bodies in the world. In Philadelphia there are one hundred Baptist churches. Dr. John Clifford the world renowned leader of the Non-Comformists in Great Britain, is the President of the Alliance and will preside. These meetings bid fair to make history for the Baptists and for the world. Dr. Clifford is to visit Canada before he returns to England, and will speak in Montreal and Winnipeg.
