IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN YEO

The demise recently of Mr. John Yeo, 299 Fitzroy Street, took from our midst a man of more than ordinary character. He was a descendant of the Yeo's of Devonshire, in the voyages of Sir Walter Raleigh, many of the Yeo's and Sankelys took part, and their sturdiness of character, made them particular favorites of his. Great followers of the sea they were for centuries and in the war of 1812 Sir James Lucas Yeo had command of the naval forces on the lakes. After centuries of sea life the 19th century finds the Yeo's again taking up the peaceful occupation of making new homes on a new continent where stirring events in a new country made up for the romance that new developments had taken out of the life of the sea.

From such stock then sprung this gentle and most lovable man. To all he was kindly, and those who knew him best loved him most. His many great kindnesses were only known to those to whom he had granted them, and he was disinclined to let his right hand know what his left had distributed.

On the occasion of Mr. Yeo's being honored by King George for long and faithful services, Mr. Michael A. McInnis, formerly of Summerside, but now the proprietor and editor of The Maple Leaf, of Oakland, California, says:—About forty years ago I then an orphan boy trying to eke out an existence as newsboy on the railway, received a kindness from Mr. Yeo which I have not forgotten. He then describes what it was, and reads to say it was just one of the little gentle touches of which Mr. Yeo was so full, but the writer goes on, often during the intervening years has the former newsboy thought of the incident, and wondered why there are not more John Yeo's in the world to make smooth the rough road over which too many orphan boys are forced to tramp their weary way.

In early manhood he joined forces with the railway workers and was one of the first engineers running on the Island road. That service he continued for over forty years. His wife was Miss McKinnon, a daughter of the late Cowan Rankin McKinnon, of Summerside, and to her this paper tenders its sincere condolences.

At the funeral which took place on Saturday, June 9, and was conducted by the Masons, Rev. E. McDougall officiated, assisted by Rev. Mr. Lamont. The air was redolent with the perfume of flowers which many kind friends and well-wishers sent, as reminders of the high esteem in which they held him. The pall-bearers were Messrs. L. B. Miller, J. McInnis, William Svenson, Harry Craswell, Fred. Houle, Herbert Love. He was laid to rest in the People's cemetery.

And so has gone a kindly and a gentle man, but to him again shall come the resurrection and the life.

BRITISH GOVT IS GOING SLOW ON REPARATIONS

LONDON, June 21.—The British government is making time on the reparation—question until receipt of the French and Belgian answer to foreign secretary Curzon's memorial asking France to define her attitude more precisely.

This information was to have been presented to Lord Curzon today but up to early afternoon neither the French nor Belgian ambassadors had asked for an appointment with the foreign secretary. It is assumed that the Belgian cabinet situation is delaying presentation of the reply.

In authoritative circles there is a distinct air of pessimism since France has given no indication of an intention to modify either her idea regarding the amount Germany shall pay or her determination to continue the occupation.

WOULD APPLY EFFICIENCY TO IMPROVE PUBLIC HEALTH

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., June 21.—Application of scientific management of public health work was advocated by John A. Kingsbury of New York, in an address today before the National Tuberculosis Association, now in session in this city. Mr. Kingsbury announced also that the Milbank Fund, of which he is director, is completing plans to spend between \$300,000 and \$500,000 annually for the next five years in New York state in cooperation with the health authorities in an effort to reduce the death rate for all causes. New York is selected as a typical rural and urban area, and Syracuse as a typical city area in which intensive demonstration will be carried on. A district of 200,000 population will also soon be selected in New York City. In these three areas of 500,000 population, the Milbank Fund will carry on the largest and ever attempted in the United States. Commenting upon the plans for the demonstration, Mr. Kingsbury said:

"In the course of the next five or ten years, in these typical American communities, we shall endeavor to determine the extent to which the general death rate can be further reduced, and which disease most readily yields to intensive effort. We shall try to determine whether it is possible practically to eliminate certain of these diseases, such as diphtheria and typhoid, and further substantially to reduce the extent of tuberculosis; we shall utilize all known methods of proven value and shall attempt to devise better ones and to measure and test the effect of each, and most important of all, we shall endeavor to determine what it will cost these typical communities to do a hundred per cent health job. We shall attempt to apply scientific management to public health work; to determine the cost of each specific project, and to keep the cost down to the minimum per capita rate consistent with efficiency."

DETECTIVE TURNS TO SCIENCE

LYONS, France, June 21.—France always is interested in developing modern methods to trace down criminals, and M. Locard, head of the Lyons detective bureau, is giving his attention to dust.

Recently he was confronted with three prisoners whose occupations it was necessary to ascertain despite their efforts at concealment. M. Locard placed the clothes of each man in a large paper bag, with three prisoners whose occupations it was necessary to ascertain dislodged from the bag, analyzed it and determined that one man was a mason, another a carpenter, and the third a coal dealer.
