EUROPEAN NEWS

GENEVA, Nov. 1 (Special)—The recent law passed by the Zurich Cantonal authorities prohibiting women teachers following their profession in the cantonal schools after marriage has been thrown out by the people. By 39,230 votes to 36,620 the electors of Zurich, who are men only, found that the law was unjust, and showed their opinion by a majority of nearly 3,000 votes against it.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 1 (Special)—King Christian and Queen Alexandra recently witnessed a review of boy and girl scouts, among which were the Crown Prince Frederik and his younger brother, Prince Knud. His Majesty the King, after having expressed his satisfaction with the drill, made a speech, in which he said: "The Queen and I have followed the Scout movement from the very beginning with the greatest interest, and we have, therefore, done as much as we could to help it. Many Danish parents will have surrendered our two boys." After the review the King invited all the Scouts—700 in all—to the royal castle, Sans Soucis, where chocolate and cake were served for them.

LONDON, Oct. 31 (Special)—Woodrow Wilson, the candidate for the United States Presidency, a writer of Pitman's system of shorthand, and Andrew Carnegie, have become vice-presidents of the Pitman Centenary, the president of which is the present Lord Mayor of London, Sir Thomas Crosby. Large gatherings in London, Manchester, and New York have already been arranged for January, 1913. Sir Isaac Pitman, whose name is familiar as the inventor of the system of shorthand known as phonography, and now used extensively wherever the English language is spoken, was born on January 4, 1813. The system of shorthand of which he was the author is employed today in reporting the proceedings of every legislative body and every law court in which the English language is spoken. It has been adapted to twenty different languages, including French, German, Italian, Spanish, Dutch, Welsh, Latin, Chinese, Japanese, and Hindustani, in addition to Esperanto.

LONDON, Oct. 31 (Special)—If all goes well, Prince Albert, second son of the King and Queen, is to be created a Knight of the Garter in the early part of June next. This ceremony will take place in the historic home of the Order in St. George's Chapel at Windsor, and the "supporters" of his Royal Highness will be the Prince of Wales and Prince Arthur of Connaught.

MILAN, Nov. 1 (Special)—Professor John Baptist Poinachi and his wife were electrocuted in their bed at Chieli, in the Abruzzi Mountains, a few days ago. It is conjectured that the lady on waking stretched out her hand to switch on the electric lamp by means of a cord wound round the metal bed-post, and that contact was made between the high and low tension wires.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 1 (Special)—M. Celestin Demblon, the well-known Socialist deputy and professor of literature, who some time ago stated himself to be capable of proving the accuracy of the theory according to which most of the Shakespeare dramas were the work of the Earl of Rutland, is about to support his contention in a book of 570 pages, which will first appear in Paris, and afterwards in London, in an English version, and under the title of "Lord Rutland is Shakespeare."

LONDON, Oct. 31 (Special)—An unusually well-informed journalist recently issued publications dealing with the life and character of the late King Edward, it is probable that Queen Alexandra will revise her original intention and allow an "authorized" life of His Majesty to be published much sooner than was intended. The late King left all his private papers to Queen Alexandra to destroy or retain for publication as seemed fit by her, and these Her Majesty has since gone through very carefully with the assistance of the King and Princess Royal.

PARIS, Nov. 1 (Special)—The body of Alexander James Stewart, second officer of the British steamer Rosebank, who has been missing for a week, has been recovered from the harbor of St. Malo. There were three wounds in his head and his hands were clenched as if he had met his death while defending himself. A sailor who returned to the Rosebank at about eleven o'clock on the night of the officer's disappearance, declared that he was followed. The police believe that Mr. Stewart

was killed and robbed by criminals who hunt the quays. They are searching for men under suspicion.

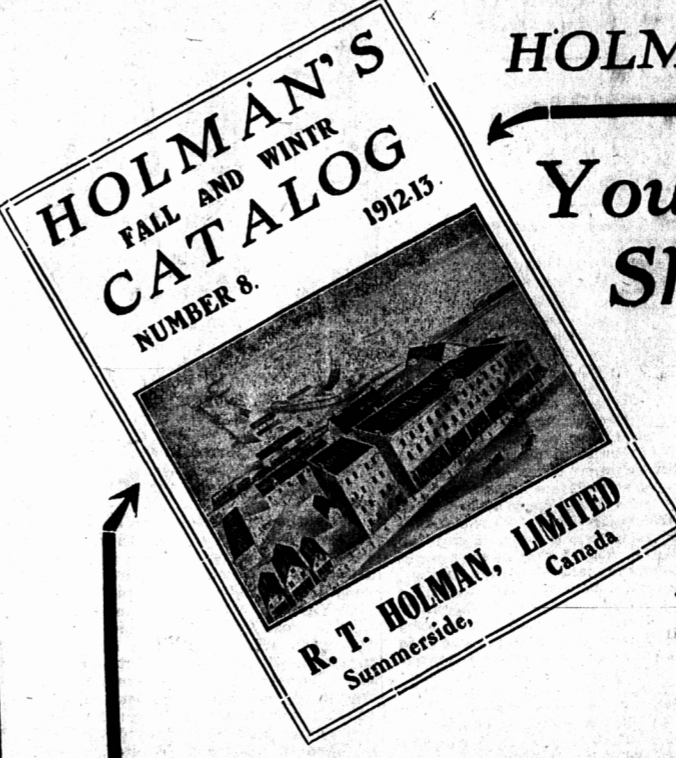
