DEPORTATION BREAKS DOWN.

Much has been said and written with regard to alien labor. Years ago the American Congress legislated to prevent the importation of aliens under contract to work in the States. This action was chiefly aimed at Canada, and the Canadian Parliament duplicated the Washington legislation. Our wise men were resolved that if Canadians could not accept an offer of employment across the line to the southward Americans should not be brought into this country to take employment under like conditions. We all remember the agitation that arose over the importation of American engineers by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company. Judge Winchester was appointed by the Government of Canada to inquire into the matter and found that American engineers had been employed for a large number of the best positions on the survey contrary to the provisions of the Alien Labor Act. These contracts were annulled and some of those employed were ordered to leave the country or be deported. So far honors were easy. The United States had deported sundry of our people, and we had shown Uncle Sam that two could play at that game.

More recently came up the cases of sundry American citizens employed on the Pere Marquette Railway in Canada. Some of these denied the right of the Canadian authorities to deport them, and their view of the case has been sustained by Mr. Justice Anglin of the Ontario High Court. This learned Judge holds that Canadian authority might take the offending immigrants to the border line but cannot properly project them across the boundary. Here are his words in part:

"But were it possible for the officer to eject a resisting alien without risk of projecting any part of his own person upon United States soil, in my opinion, the application of the propelling force operating upon the person of the alien while wholly or partly within the foreign territory is an extra-territorial constraint of such alien

by the Canadian officer, and as such cannot be authorized by the Canadian Parliament."

So there you are. You may cut your pound of flesh but you must not shed a drop of Christian blood. You may take your man to the border but you must not "project" him or any part of him across the border. Moreover there is an old treaty between Britain and the United States guaranteeing the right of their respective citizens to come and go at will into or out of the territorial possessions of each other. And a treaty is the higher law which neither Parliament nor Congress may set aside. So deportation breaks down. If this decision is found neither country can depart the citizens of the other.

NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

It will be an event in the history of Charlottetown when that great representative body, the National Council of Women, assembles in our midst next week. Half the population of Canada is feminine. For that half of the nation this is the Parliament and our city will be for the time being the capital city. Its members, duly elected, will come to us from every section of the vast Dominion—from the Provinces by the sea, from the provinces by the St. Lawrence and the Great Lakes, from the ocean-like prairies and the far Pacific slope. They will come not as representatives of differing parties, or opposing tariff policies, but as representatives of the homes, and of the hundreds of organized societies in which the womanhood of Canada is working for the social uplifting and moral and spiritual betterment of our common country.

We are assured that the members of the National Council will receive a very hearty welcome when they come. They do us honor by their coming. We can but honor them for their worth and all the gracious influences they carry in their train. Has not the wisest of men written

of the virtuous woman that "her price is far above rubies?" Such are these fair delegates who are coming to tarry for a few days in our midst. And we ought also to remember that what is as yet but a dream among mankind has been already realized by the women of the nations. "The Parliament of Man, the federation of the world" exists as yet but in the poet's fancy. But the Parliament of Woman, and the federation of the civilized world is already an accomplished fact, in the International Council of Women. Last year it assembled at Berlin. In fact the Women's Council in its local, national and international bodies, and in the scope of its beneficent agencies and operations is one of the greatest institutions of the twentieth century.

THE EXHIBITION PRIZE LIST 1905.

The P. E. I. Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition Prize List for 1905 is now ready for distribution. It is neatly printed and on the cover is an artistic illustration most appropriate in design.

As an introduction the Directors say:— In presenting the Prize List for the Maritime Inter-Provincial Exhibition to be held in Charlottetown from the 20th to the 29th September next, the management have little to add to what has already been frequently told in the introduction to former Prize Lists.

They have, year in and year out, so emphasized and insisted on the real value of the Exhibition being educational, that their views in that respect seem now to be adopted by the best agricultural opinion in this Province.

It has been most gratifying to those who have devoted much time for the last fifteen years to this subject, to find that their efforts have been appreciated, and that at the Convention of Farmers' Insituted held in Charlottetown a short time ago, the gentlemen there assembled, representing the most advanced practical and theoretical Agriculturists of this Island, in no ambiguous terms expressed their approval of the work that has been done at those Exhibitions, and that they also endorsed the view, long held and strenuously insisted upon by the management, that the value of the Exhibition was greatly enhanced by being thrown open to the sister Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

We are glad to be able to say that the Government propose to make the grant for prizes certain for at least another year, so that in 1906 we may hope to be able to place the Prize Lists in the hands of the public not later than Easter. It is to be hoped that in another year it will be made certain for a much longer period.

We again ask the citizens of Charlottetown to extend a hearty welcome to visitors from other places, and to assist the management in providing for their accommodation.

THE RIVERS OF NEW ENGLAND.

New England and the Provinces are now looking their best the recent frequent rains having brought out the foliage so that now it is a perfect delight to travel through the country. People who reside in the Provinces are many of them unaware of the fact that by a trip over the All Rail Line they cross and have a view of all of the principal rivers of New England other than the Connecticut. All are familiar with the river St. John then crossing the St. Croix the passenger is at once in the State of Maine and soon reaches the Penobscot riding along the banks of it for over fifty miles and at Lincoln's magnificent views of Mt. Katahdin, Maine's highest Mountain, are obtained. After leaving Bangor one soon comes to the Sebasticook and crossing the Kennebec at Waterville rides along its banks for more than forty miles and soon after leaving the Kennebec the Androscoggin is crossed at Brunswick. From Brunswick to Portland, the metropolis of the State of Maine, it is only about thirty miles, and about a dozen miles beyond Portland the Saco is reached and crossed. A few miles further on is the Piscataquis and on reaching its west side one is in the State of New Hampshire and little further on another state line is crossed into Massachusetts. The grand Merrimac is seen and crossed and just before reaching Boston one comes onto the Mystic and the Charles. A trip over the All Rail Line then is always one of geographical interest and passengers are daily understanding its value.

THE MARKETS.

The market Tuesday was well attended and well stocked with produce.

The tendency in the price of butter is still downward selling from 18 to 20c per lb. Eggs maintain their price at 15 to 17c per doz.

Pow! per lb sold from 75c to \$1.00 a pair. Mackerel were plentiful and sold from 12 to 15c each. A good quantity of lobsters was on sale from 8 to 25c each. Two exceptionally large lobsters weighing 17 lbs each attracted much notice.
