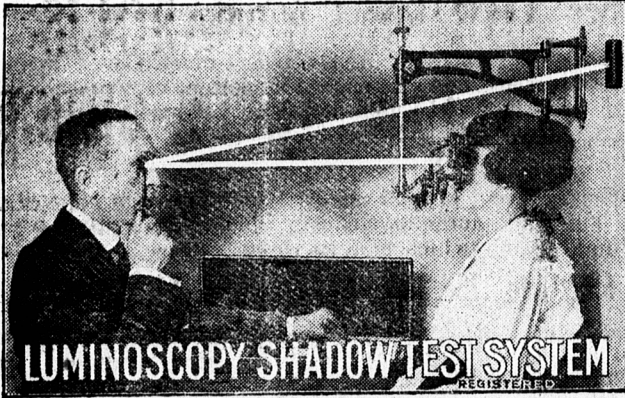

HIGH PRICES OF PAINTS MAKE PAINTING LOOK SERIOUS.

LAYMAN'S AUXILIARY GUILD.—A number of Laymen representing Protestant denominations, and organizations in the city, met last Sunday morning in the parlor of Y. M. C. A. for a prayer and conference session.
