LONDON.—German casualties reported during July in the German official lists, but not necessarily having occurred in July, aggregated 89,863, as follows:  
Killed or died of wounds or sickness..... 21,389  
Prisoners or missing..... 14,620  
Severely wounded..... 13,896  
Wounded and slightly wounded..... 39,958  
The total German casualties of all classes since the beginning of the war exceeds 4,500,000.
