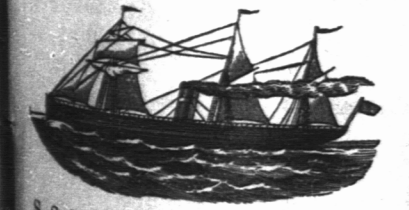

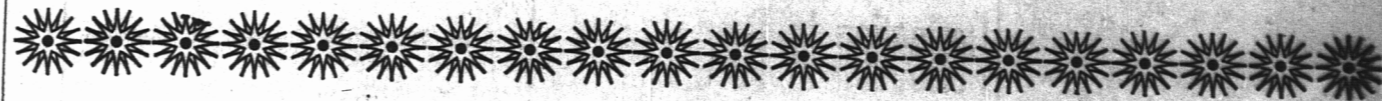

SOUTH EASTERN ITEMS.—The hay is being cut and securely housed with all possible speed to avoid the frequent rains. It is a fairly good crop some what better perhaps than it was for the past few years, excepting last year.—Mr J. D. MacLean, principal of Mission City school, British Columbia, and son of Roderick MacLean, Esq, of Culloden, is home on a short visit to his friends in his native province. Mr. MacLean, having been a teacher here, left about six years ago and engaged in the same profession in B. C. where more remunerative salaries are paid. It is some satisfaction to know that Islanders hold their own in the Pacific province as well as elsewhere. The leading school in that province the Victoria Central school has an Islander—Mr. Gillis, formerly of St. Catharines—as its principal. Mrs. Murdoch Matheson and her mother, Mrs. MacLean, of Heatherdale, were badly injured Sunday, 17th inst, while returning from church. At a corner the carriage upset throwing both ladies with great violence to the ground. They received a bad shaking-up, although, strange to say, no bones were broken.—Miss Roseana MacLean, daughter of Mrs MacLean, arrived home from Boston, Saturday, to give them all the required attendance.—Another very painful accident occurred at Valleyfield, Monday, 18th inst, when the five year old son of Roderick MacKenzie, Esq., had his foot almost completely cut off by a mower. It appears that he, along with his little brother, was playing in a field where the hay was being cut, when, in some unaccountable way, he got in front of the knife, with the result that the bone was completely cut at the ankle, leaving nothing uncut but very little more than the skin. The poor little fellow scarcely ever uttered a cry notwithstanding the terrible pain he must have been suffering, and is progressing as favorably as could be expected under the circumstances. Drs. Martin, of Grand View, and MacLaren, of Brudenell, who were in attendance, did not think it advisable to have the foot amputated as yet, owing to the great loss of blood and consequent weakness.—The communion services were held at Valleyfield Presbyterian church, on Sunday, 17th inst, when a very large crowd was in attendance as usual. The pastor, Rev R. MacLean, assisted by Rev. Mr. Stirling, officiated.—A very quiet and orderly church tea was held at Little Sands on the 21st inst. This is a very attractive spot and consequently a large crowd took advantage of the fine weather and pleasant drive. There is some talk of another tea being held at Murray River in the near future.—Rev. Theophrastus MacLeod occupied the pulpit of the Woodville Presbyterian church on Sunday, 24th inst, and delivered a very able and eloquent sermon. Mr MacLeod, being well and favorably known in these sections was listened to with much satisfaction by a large and appreciative audience.—The new Presbyterian Church at Little Sands will be opened and dedicated for public worship on Sunday, 31st inst. A number of neighboring ministers and some from a distance are expected to be present on the occasion. The church is said to be one of the finest country churches in the province.

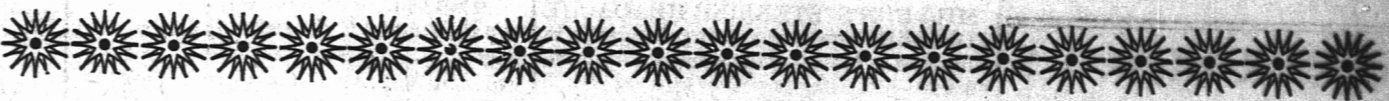

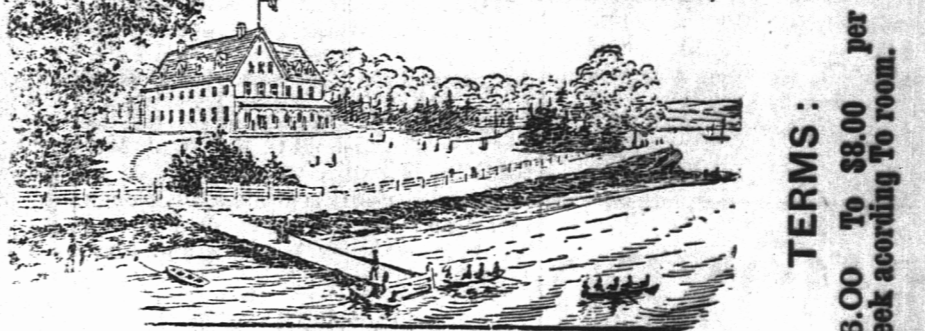

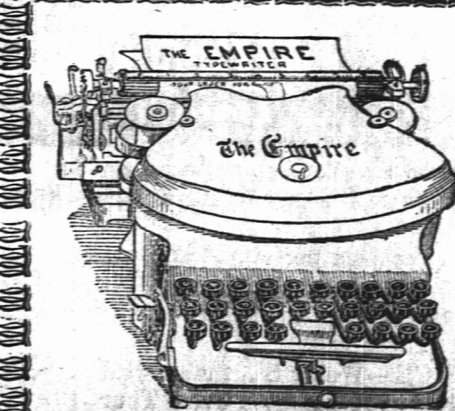
