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Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may have a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Section—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homestead—May live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or on a homestead of at least 40 acres, or on a quarter section where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homestead in good standing may be re-empted a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$20 per acre. Dues—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation, or 25 acres extra cultivation and 25 acres extra cultivation in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Life use may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. GERMANY'S POISONED PROPAGANDA

Evidences continue to accumulate of the poisoned propaganda still carried on by Germany, and that therefore calls for an offsetting one of truth. A Washington despatch, dated March 11, 1918, says:—One of the most potent means by which the morals of the Russian army and people have been undermined has been by systematic work in propaganda among Russian prisoners. Like most other German activities, this has been highly organized, and it shows greater psychological insight than many of the German methods. It is quite as unscrupulous and unrelenting as the measures by which the Germans crushed the physical powers of their prisoners. The article then proceeds to describe a Russian illustrated paper, printed in Berlin, which was industriously circulated in the Russian army, barracks and prison camps. The prisoners read it since they had nothing else to read, and they fell under its spell. It was calculated to produce feelings of gloom, hopelessness, homesickness and thoughts of dear ones at home. They pictured the life of the lowly Russian people as it is affected by war; it laid emphasis on the poverty everywhere, the sick, hungry children, the sobbing mothers, the war cripples neglected by all and begging at the cross-roads and in the streets. There was never a cheery line to be found in this German-made Russian literature given to the prisoners of war. It was always the same: German strength and prosperity; Russian weakness in the field and weakness at home. Edgar Ensel Wovner, special war correspondent in Italy, writes from Rome under date of February 17, 1918, regarding the German-Austrian "poisoned propaganda" among the Italian troops: "To increase the infection the Italians in the trenches were subjected to a paper offensive in the form of myriad manifestos purporting to convey important items of news to the soldiers. These mendacious projectiles were shot from guns in the form of great shells, which broke on concussion with the earth and scattered them broadcast; they were dropped by airmen. The lies they told were stupid enough, but they attacked the Italian in his weakest point, which is national pride. "Chiefly they referred to the high-handedness of hypocritical British and French troops in Italian towns. They told of anti-war uprisings in a score of Italian cities. An entire illustrated pamphlet was dedicated to the Anglo-French oppression in Italy the most recent British Colony." Had it not produced its little effect, this sowing of lurid fantasy and lies would seem but a wet theatrical extravaganza. But when the sowing was deemed complete, Austrians and Germans went forward confidently to reap the harvest.

ESCALLOPED POTATOES—Wash, pare, soak and cut four potatoes in one-fourth inch slices. Put a layer in baking dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper dredge with cornmeal or flour and dot over with one-half tablespoon of butter substitute. Repeat. Add hot milk until it may be seen through top layer. Bake one and one-fourth hours or until potato is soft.

PRINCESS VICTORIA'S REST CLUB

The world at large is beginning to hear of a work that was commenced in the early months of the war and has been progressing steadily ever since. The prime mover in this was Princess Victoria and it is due to her thoughtfulness and sympathy that British nurses in France have been able to recover from the strain of hospital service on the firing line. Nine rest clubs in all have been established by the Princess, and are located at Wimereux, Cambrai, St. Omer, Rouen, Abbeville, Calais, St. Etienne, Boulogne and Bapaume. The crowning glory is a residential club in Paris thus making it possible for nurses to have Paris leave occasionally and enjoy what would otherwise be entirely out of their reach.

Closely associated with the Princess and of great service in collecting funds and managing the intricate and numerous details of the work are: Lady Algernon Gordon-Lennox who is director in France; and Lady Ponsbury, the Hon. Lady Keppel, Lady Hugh Grosvenor, Lady Holford, Hon. Mrs. Cyril Ward, Lady Florence Willoughby (secretary) and Mrs. J. Covey Williams (treasurer). The Director-General of the Medical Services recognizes the clubs as medical units under his jurisdiction. Light meals, tea and sometimes breakfast, are furnished at reasonable prices. Members pay merely a nominal fee which entitles them to the privileges of the club at any base through which they may be passing. Administrators of the W.A.A.C. and women ambulance drivers are also entitled to the privileges of the club.

The working day of the nursing sisters consists of anything from ten to twenty hours and every hour of the day and night they face death with the soldiers. Sleeping under canvas with gas masks and tin hats beside their cot, living under fire for weeks at a time, seeing the harrowing side of life "heroes and martyrs" these women deserve a retreat which breathes nothing but cheerfulness and comfort and rest. King George and Queen Mary have donated a car for the use of Lady Gordon-Lennox and in this way she is able to visit each one of the stations while directing the general work in the military hospital in Boulogne where she has been since 1914. Nursing sisters from England, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, New Zealand, Canada and the United States are working side by side in these hospitals with never a thought except the good of the common cause.

The Paris club is a special boon to overseas nurses as the matron-in-chief could see no way of granting Paris leave until this club was opened. This club sets a record for speedy and effective work as it was founded, furnished and opened in six weeks, when supplies were not obtainable and transportation was uncertain and hazardous. There are guest rooms for thirty sisters in the Paris club house and a cozy sitting room and restaurant. Two young V. A. D.s assist the English lady who is in charge and there are three French servants.

THE CIVILIAN

The civilian gets his rations, as a German newspaper puts it, "if sufficient supplies are in the hands of the authorities." That important condition, as we know from frequent complaints is often unfulfilled. The nominal weekly allowance of Bread varies from just over 3 1/2 lb. in Dusseldorf to 4 lb. 6 oz. in Dresden and Munich. In Berlin it is just over 4 1/2 lb. In some cases there is an additional weekly ration of Flour—generally from 1 oz. to 3 1/2 oz., and also an ounce or so of cereal preparations like groats or malted barley. The weekly allowance of Meat is, up and down, about half a pound a head. In none of the cities has it exceeded 5 1/2 oz., and it sometimes falls as low as 5 oz. Where Sausage is available in addition, the highest allowance recorded is 1/2 oz. Where Fish makes its appearance, it is generally rationed at less than 1 oz. a head weekly, and the allowance of Eggs ranges from one to four per month.

The weekly allowance of Potatoes is 7 lb. to 8 lb., with 2 lb. or 3 lb. extra in places for "heavy workers." The weekly allowance of Butter or Margarine is rarely above 3 oz. The Cheese ration varies from 1 oz. to 4 1/2 oz. weekly, according to the supply. The Sugar ration is from 5 1/2 oz. to 8 1/2 oz. weekly, with an extra allowance for very young children. Jam, Treacle, or "artificial" Honey is divided according to the local supplies. The rations are sometimes cut as fine as 7-10 of an ounce weekly.

"Coffee substitutes"—there is no mention of real coffee—are portioned out as they can be obtained—sometimes in quantities of less than 1/2 oz. a week. Such as they are, the rations are often nominal, and the population does not receive anything like the full amount. The Vorwarts mentions a commune which "received during the last six weeks one egg and a little German tea. Nothing else is provided but fresh vegetables... and the regulation 7 lb. of potatoes." Reality.
