Gloomy View of Situation in Ireland

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The Irish conference reassembled in Downing Street, at the official residence of Premier Lloyd George, yesterday afternoon to discuss the latest phases of the Irish situation. Those present were Mr. Lloyd George, J. Austen Chamberlain, Lord Frivy Seal, Viscount Birkenhead, Lord Chancellor, and Sir Robert S. Hoare, Chancellor of the Exchequer.

The general impression of the situation after the meeting was a very gloomy one. The Irishmen submitted the result of the Daily Eireann's examination of the latest proposals of the Government and pointed out where they were unacceptable. They had said no more on Thursday night than that the proposals required full consideration and had not yielded any points in dispute.

The meeting of the Daily Eireann cabinet in Dublin Saturday emphasized the principles involved in the scheme, and the impression conveyed was that no principle would be sacrificed to obtain Ulster's assent or to put Ulster in the wrong if it refused assent.

Premier Lloyd George's difficulty according to those in close touch with him is that he cannot ask Ulster to agree to any terms which British opinion would not endorse. He is firm in the stand that the allegiance question cannot be abandoned or camouflaged, and this, it is said, has proved the most insuperable of all the obstacles to a settlement.

The proposal that the King might be recognized as the British federal monarch was objected to by the British ministers. It was declared it would not be acceptable to Ulster and would not be intelligible to the British electors. An attempt was made to devise some form of allegiance to the Sinn Fein which, accept, but this apparently proved unsuccessful.

The seven British representatives of the original Irish conference are expected to meet tomorrow. It is presumed this meeting may be preliminary to declaring the conference of altogether.

As things stand the net result, in the opinion of the commentators, will be to throw the onus of the collapse on the Sinn Fein, and this will bring back Premier Lloyd George to the position he assumed before the negotiations started. That British law must be maintained and authority sought for destruction, Meinshild, dominance in the Irish administration would rest with the military.

Thus far no agreement has been reached for any prolonged extension of the truce.

Exorbitant Alimony

Woman With Eight Children Granted \$5 a Week

DETROIT, Dec. 7.—Sixteen children, eight belonging to Ignatz Rambowski and eight to his wife, Mary, a widow whom he married on July 14, caused such an ear-splitting turmoil in their home that they had to separate.

Then the real difference lies with the heifers; from experiments we know that heifers from a good sire and bred from common cows, produce from three to five pounds per day more milk than their mothers, say four pounds for three hundred

days the world in an 1200 pounds each for the year to cost \$200 to 250 hundred pounds would be \$200 gain on each heifer it does not take long to make up the difference in the price of the two heifers, besides having better foundation stock for the next generation and the high yield of milk and fat products from the results of using better sires.

During the past two or three years we have heard of very high prices being paid for sires that have proper backing. The question arises are they worth the money? A close view they do not seem to be but when one lets his vision extend over a period of ten or fifteen years the answer is sure to be yes.

The results do not all come the first year, but like any good investment they are coming in every year and increasing as the years go on as each succeeding generation shows an improvement.

On the opposite, if the bull is deficient in quality these characteristics are passed on to his daughter and the brooder not only loses one year but loses until the last calf is eradicated.

The proper kind of a bull may cost \$250.00 while one of any old kind may be bought for possibly \$75.00, here is an apparent saving of \$175.00.

For three years not much difference is seen except perhaps one or many not be of as nice a type as the high yield of the better bull, but on the third year they are coming into milk. Now the interest of money paid for the poorer animal brings his cost up to about \$300.00, while the well bred fellow will have cost his owner nearly \$300.00. The care and feed being about equal.

Advertisement for Not Enough Workers, Many Excursion "Harvesters" Refused to Harvest. Text: 'WINNIPEG, Dec 7.—To eliminate the trouble experienced last fall in the West when it was found that many farmers were unable to get sufficient help, despite the large number of men brought in from the past, a movement will be inaugurated at once to see the support of Canadian railways in an effort to prevent any further rise in harvesters taking advantage of cheap rates from Eastern Canada in the future. The support of Manitoba in this move is being sought by T. M. Molloy, commissioner of labor for Saskatchewan, who declares that if Manitoba authorities are willing to cooperate, Saskatchewan intends to ask the railways to adopt more drastic regulations concerning the bringing of harvest workers to the West. Last fall railway figures show that 38,000 harvesters were brought into Saskatchewan, and during the rush we asked the railways to cancel further excursions, yet when the men were all placed on farms it was found many farmers were without sufficient help,' said Mr. Molloy. 'Upon investigation it was found that many hand-cuts took advantage of the cheap fares to take a long-desired trip west, with the result we were deceived in the actual number of harvesters available.'
