After leaving the Island and arriving at Moncton the writer says: "Here is the loveliest spot on our planet and well named the Garden of Nova Scotia. Here the people are wealthy and surrounded by everything calculated to make life pleasant and enjoyable. For beauty of scenery and excellence of surrounding this place caps the climax of all we have seen since leaving Moncton." At the time of writing Mr. and Mrs. Teed were visiting Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Ston—from whom the place takes its name. Mr. and Mrs. Teed arrived home last night.—Moncton Times.

Mr. G. A. Freeze the popular representative has presented the GUARDIAN with a neat folder issued by the All Rail Route from which the following extracts are taken: "The land of Evangeline, and for that matter the whole of that portion of Eastern New England and of Canada so often termed the Maritime Provinces, in one vast pleasure or play-ground to which tourists of pleasure seekers take themselves for a season of enjoyment and recuperation. The journey from St. John, Halifax, Charlottetown, and many other well-known places lies through a section replete in natural scenic embellishments and attractions which, coupled with the conveniences and comforts of modern up-to-day transportation facilities such as are now operated by the Boston & Maine Railroad and its connecting lines, must necessarily become the leading and popular mode of migration. For the pleasure seeker and the regular traveller as well there are as many satisfactory advantages to be gained in travelling to this bourne by rail, among which is the absence of that great discomfort caused by a rough sea voyage, namely sea-sickness. The distance between Boston and Halifax has been compassed by the lines of the great transportation companies that to-day it is possible for one to partake of the morning feast in the Hub, while the breakfast of the morrow may be taken in the provincial city of Halifax, the journey thither having been accomplished by easy stages through a rich and decidedly interesting section of New England in coaches whether the luxurious palace car or the palatial coach, that are of a standard of excellence that is unequalled, and amid surroundings which are conducive elements for comfortable and pleasurable travelling. Not far from Halifax is the town of Pictou, which mariners say is as fine as any on the shores of the gulf, and it is from here that steamers may be taken for Prince Edward Island. This island, some fifteen miles distant from the mainland, covers a territory of no less than two thousand one hundred square miles, and by the railroad system which is operated thereon the farthest ends of the island are made accessible. Perhaps the best known of its few towns is Charlottetown, which has a location on a gently rising ground overlooking the Hillsborough River and fronts on an exceptionally fine harbor. Summerside, another island settlement, reached by steamer from Point du Chene, has picturesque surroundings. A short trip by rail to Tignish will bring to view two quiet settlements, and the pastoral beauties which surround them are but the characteristic elements of the entire island."
