The Markets

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Que., April 8.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market was quiet today, there being practically no demand from the United Kingdom and the continent. A little trading was done in wheat and barley in the domestic market for export accounts, but the demand from local and country buyers for coarse grains was slow. The undertone was steady and prices were unchanged. Prices for all grades of spring and winter wheat flour were well maintained under a quiet demand from all sources. A fair amount of business was done in most lines of millfeed and the tone of the market was steady. The demand for standard grades of rolled oats was limited but prices were unchanged. The undertone to the egg market continued easy, but there was no further change in values. The trade was active. The receipts were 3,568 cases. The condition of the market for potatoes was unchanged business being slow and the feeling steady. Sales of odd cars of Quebec varieties were made at \$1.20 to \$1.15 per bag of 50 pounds in bulk, extra. The weakness that has characterized the local butter trade this week was prominent again today and prices were reduced another 1/2 to 1 cent per pound. This was due to the increased supplies of fresh made butter coming forward. Eastern townships No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 43 1/2 cents to 44 cents per pound. The receipts were 254 packages. The cheese trade continued dull but values ruled steady. Western grades were quoted at 16 1/2 cents to 17 cents per pound. The receipts were 506 boxes.

OTTAWA, Ont., (Eggs)—Canadian egg markets are generally steady with sales active in anticipation of the Easter trade.

Calgary: Egg receipts are light with market steady and prices unchanged. Dealers are quoting com-
