CAMBRIA FIGHT STILL GOING ON

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN THE FIELD, Dec. 8.—Germany hasn't finished her effort out of Cambria. Fighting was still continuing today. It has abated somewhat from the ferocity of the past few days. Nevertheless British aviators report that more German troops massing, more guns being hurriedly yanked to battle front positions and every indication that Crown Prince Rupprecht was far from giving up, after failing in his initial attempts. Moreover, artillery fire was increasing today.

British Look for a Resumption of Fighting on Same Tremendous Scale as for Last Few Days.

British officers believed the most critical moment around Cambria had passed today. They were equally certain, however, that Hindenburg would not allow matters to stand where they now are. They looked for a resumption of fighting on the same tremendous scale of the past few days, which has strewn German corpses around the Cambrai bulge. It was rumored today that Hindenburg had either been in the Cambrai front or was there now.

VALUE OF FIELD CROPS

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—The Census and Statistics Office has issued a preliminary estimate of the total value of the field crops of Canada for the year 1917, as compared with the finally revised estimates of 1916 and 1915. The estimated values for 1917 represent the prices received by farmers, and are calculated from current market quotations; they are subject to revision after the compilation of returns from correspondents in December. According to the preliminary estimate the total value of all field crops for 1917 is \$1,089,697,600, as compared with \$886,494,200 in 1916 and \$825,370,600 in 1915. This is the first time that the estimate of field crops of Canada has reached one billion dollars, this large figure being due to the high prices now ruling. The total of \$1,089,697,600 is made up of \$451,874,000 for wheat, as compared with \$344,096,400 in 1916, of \$236,142,000 for oats, as compared with \$210,957,500 of \$145,361,000 for hay, clover and alfalfa, as compared with \$171,613,900 and of \$81,355,000 for potatoes, as compared with \$50,882,200. The aggregate value of other grain crops is \$134,006,700, as compared with \$84,679,800 and of other root and fodder crops \$40,974,700, as compared with \$34,155,000. The estimate of value for 1917 will be published as usual in January.

M. Nabokoff, said the Allies, discussing the question with Mr. Balfour, said this was another attempt of minister Von Kuhlmann to draw the Allies into a net, and it was determined that under no circumstances would one of the Allies negotiate at least until the matter could be considered collectively.

HERO WELCOMED BACK

That the people of Springfield, Lo., desire to honor a battle scarred hero was clearly demonstrated on the evening of Nov. 23rd, when they repaired to the Temperance Hall to welcome home Lieut. John MacKenzie of the famous Fifth Batt. At eight o'clock the meeting was called to order by Mr. Peter Sinclair, who in brief but fitting terms paid a high tribute to Lieut. MacKenzie who had taken part in all the great battles in which the Canadians have participated. The first item on the program was bag-pipe music by Piper Ronald MacPhee of Bradabang, during the rendition of which the returned hero came to the platform by his old associates. The chairman then called on Mr. Walter MacKenzie who came forward and read the following address:
To Lieut. MacKenzie:
Dear Friend:
It is with feelings of pleasure mingled with pride that your old associates of Unit. Division, S. of T., have assembled here tonight to welcome you home after thirty-three months of active service on the blood stained fields of Flanders. Some years ago you came to us a stranger, yet in a short time you proved your worth that you were a true son of the land of the Heather. In your military career you have fully upheld the traditions of that noble race of loyal-hearted Scotsmen whose deeds of valor would adorn the annals of any nation.
We feel on this occasion that we must not let the opportunity pass of paying tribute to the lion's share taken by your family in maintaining the cause of freedom, justice and British fair-play. Yours has been a noble response—every member of military age having heeded the call of the Nation—and now with reverence we think of your brother who has laid down his life that we might live.
In conclusion, permit us to congratulate you most heartily upon the commission that has been awarded you in recognition of your valued services to your country. Again we would assure of a most hearty welcome and our wish that continued success attend you in all your undertakings.

CAMBRIA FIGHT IS STILL INTENSE

German Artillery Fire Increasing in Whole Sector and Infantry are Being Massed for Another Drive.
The completeness of the failure of the German plans was illustrated in prisoners' statements today that German Uhlans (cavalry) were held for days in readiness behind the lines for the break in the British front that the Germans schemed to attain, but which they did not achieve. The artillery fire on the whole Cambrai sector was increasing today and the massing of more infantry forces forecast another drive. The German reinforcements have come from various parts of the western front.
Germans Appear to Be Taking Troops From A Along the Western Front for Cambrai Offensive.
I was in Flanders Sunday during a British advance in the Passchendaele region and at that time comment was evoked on the fact that the German barrage was nine minutes late and of straw lighter force than that in any previous fighting. The answer was apparent. Either the British guns had knocked out the enemy artillery, or the Germans had been withdrawing their pieces for use on another front. The latter was undoubtedly the correct assumption. Apparently Hindenburg and Rupprecht will continue the battle at Cambrai as long as troops are available. The British officials today are confident the breach will be unable to make much headway.
GERMANY FAILED TO ENTRAP ALLIES.
LONDON, Dec. 7.—The installment of secret documents made public on Tuesday by the Bolshevik foreign minister, according to a Petrograd despatch to the Daily Mail, included a telegram from M. Nabokoff, the charge in London, to foreign minister Tereschenko, dated October 6, which begins:
"Extra secret. Only for Minister."
The telegram intimates that M. Nabokoff had informed a special meeting of the Ambassadors of France, Italy, the United States and Japan that he had received information from Madrid to the effect that a highly placed personage in Berlin had expressed a wish to the Spanish Ambassador there to enter into peace negotiations. The Spanish government, however, could not undertake mediation and confined itself to stating that fact.
Having received this message, there were two alternatives, either to leave the German inquiry unanswered, or to reply very carefully, and not to reply would have given the German government an opportunity to use the action as a means of raising the spirits of the German people and strengthening Germany's position in addition to increasing the agitation in Russia.
