HE SUICIDED IN DISPONDENT FIT

The people of Cardigan Bridge were startled yesterday morning to learn that one of their well-known residents named James L. McDonald had committed suicide by hanging himself in a barn owned by his cousin, Mrs. John Griffin, about a mile from the bridge.

The unfortunate man had been drinking during the past few days. On Thursday evening he went to Mrs. Griffin's home and stayed there all night. After arising in the morning he had breakfast as usual and then went outside. A short time after, about six o'clock, he was found hanging in the barn dead.

Dr. Allen, the coroner was sent for and after viewing the body decided that under the circumstances an inquest was unnecessary.

The late Mr. McDonald was a plasterer and about fifty-five years of age. He was unmarried, has no brothers living and only one sister.

The funeral will take place from his late home this morning at 9 o'clock to the Roman Catholic Cemetery at Cardigan Bridge.
