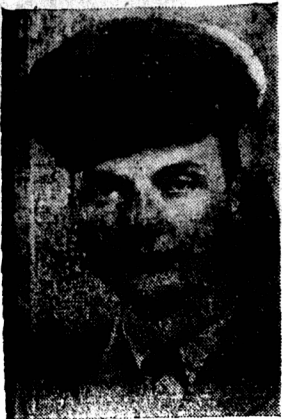

Big Artesian Basins Boost Water Supply

SYDNEY, Australia, Sept. 20 — (CP) — Because rain and rivers are scarce in a large part of Australia, the country augments its water supply by means of nearly 3,000 artesian and sub-artesian bores which yield about 340,000,000 gallons of water a day.

This source of water is most important since two of Australia's largest industries, wool and wheat, depend heavily on water and can be crippled by drought.

However, the area in which artesian wells are present extends over nearly one-third of the country and one section of it, known as the Great Australian Artesian Basin is said to be the largest discovered.

This big basin alone covers nearly one-fifth of the country extending from the northeast tip nearly 1,500 miles to the south. The Northern Territory, and the States of Queensland, New South Wales and South Australia all have a share of it.

There is a second artesian basin covering parts of New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia and a few small ones in West Australia. Their water has been tapped from a depth of 10 feet to 7,000 feet and the flow is in varying quantities, some yield as much as 1,000,000 gallons a day.

The water is used for domestic purposes, for gardens and stock watering and sometimes is chemically treated when the removal of harmful minerals is necessary.

Strenuous Fight Expected Before Election in N.Z.

Canadian Press Correspondent AUCKLAND, N. Z., Sept. 20 — (CP) — With the present Parliament's term of office drawing to a close all interest in New Zealand is centring in the general election to be held on Nov. 21, the 11th anniversary of the Labor government's accession to power.

There is every indication that the election campaign will be one of the most strenuously contested in the country's history. At present the Labor and National parties between them hold every seat in the House of Representatives. Labor holds 44 seats and National 35. Both parties are making a bid for an electoral victory and for the first time both will contest every seat.

So far there is no sign of a third party. At the last election in 1943 two other fairly large groups contested many of the seats. One was the Democratic Labor party, formed by J. A. Lee, formerly the influential leader of the Labor party's left wing, and his expulsion from the party. The other was a large group of independents who opposed party politics and who banded together to present their aims to the electorate.

Neither of these groups won a single seat in the House. Mr. Lee, who fared best of any of them, polled only 3,961 votes against his Labor opponent's 10,010.

Nothing has been heard recently of the Independent group, but Mr. Lee's dramatic personality has kept the Democratic Labor party alive. It has been announced that it will contest some seats in the coming campaign but is unlikely to conduct as large a campaign as at the last election.

Left-Wing Split It is expected only a few seats the Labor party's chances should be correspondingly improved. While the Democratic Labor party won no seats at the last election it captured much of the left-wing vote and lost Labor crucial votes against the Nationalists in closely-contested seats.

The Communists did not contest any seats in the last election but will put up a limited number of candidates in November. The party has announced it will support the Labor party for other seats, although Labor has rejected any form of electoral alliance. No Communist has ever been elected to the New Zealand House of Representatives.

There have been four by-elections since the last general election. In each the vote has been somewhat more in favor of the National Party than at the general election, but only one has changed its party alliance. This was at the last by-election where a small Labor majority was changed into a small Nationalist lead.

The only other change has been the death last month of Mr. H. A. Arney, the only Independent in the House. A former Cabinet Minister, he had stood at recent elections as an Independent not attached to any group, but had voted with Labor on policy matters.
