WAR AND FOX MARKET

Sunday Magazine of the Boston Post recently published a cut of two fox puppies under which was the following comment: "Here are two black fox puppies two weeks old. They are imported stock raised in captivity, and before the war would have been worth \$1,500 apiece."

Puppies of the best pedigree P. E. Island stock sold before the war from \$500 to \$7500," he says.

ISLAND NCAPTAIN IN BIG BATTLE

The following letter has been received by Miss Hazel McDonald, Wheatley River, from her brother Dan, who is now serving with the 1st Contingent in France.

My Dear Sister Hazel:—Thought I would drop a few lines today to let you know we are still alive and getting along fine with the Germans but we gave them a good thrashing at Neuve Chapelle and here we are again. We had Capt. McKay from P. E. I. with us at the time of the big battle where the Canadians made a name for themselves. Capt. McKay is the only officer that I met who comes from P. E. I. since I came to France.

Dear Mac:—Since I have seen you last I have had the experience of my life. Our Captain was killed in the beginning of the fray and we lost forty-five men going into the trenches. It was a horrible looking sight to see the battle field the morning after the bayonet charge. I have seen sights that I shall never forget.
