SPLENDID COW.—Ruby Nig, the four-year-old Holstein cow owned by Messrs. Lee & Clark, Victoria, P. E. I., has just completed a wonderful feat. Last year she was entered as a three-year-old in the Record of Performance test and gave in the twelve months 16,439 pounds of milk, containing six hundred pounds of fat, equivalent to seven hundred pounds of butter. She dropped a beautiful heifer on the 6th of April, and was put into the Record of Merit test, when she gave in seven days 5604 lbs. of milk, containing 205 1/2 lbs. butter fat, equivalent to 24 lbs. of butter. She came out of this test in the best of condition and gave, after the test had been completed, 82 lbs. of milk in one day. It is stock of this kind that is building up Crapaud factory and making the district known all over Canada as a Holstein centre. This enterprising firm of breeders are having inquiries for cattle all over Canada and are making sales at fancy prices.
