—The Bonavista, from Montreal, arrived in Summerside about five p. m. yesterday with a large inward freight and will sail for St. John's, Nfld., via Charlottetown and the Sydney about noon today. Her cargo from Summerside will consist of 1500 bags of oats, ten tons of hay and a quantity of small freight.

—Summerside was stirred by the announcement of another sudden death yesterday morning when the Rev. Henry Bamford passed peacefully away about eight o'clock at the residence of his son Rev. F. S. Bamford. The deceased who was seventy-one years of age had been ailing for the past year with Bright's Disease, but was able to be up around the house all the time up to the night before his death. Yesterday morning when his son went up to enquire what was keeping him late for breakfast he found him dying and in a few minutes he was dead. He was a native of Rosedale, England, and came to Canada about six years ago with his son with whom he has since resided. The funeral takes place at 3.30 p. m. tomorrow, Tuesday, to the People's Cemetery.

**COUNT DE LESSEPS IS VERY WRATHY.**  
MONTREAL, June 24—Everything is ready for the opening of the Aviation week to-morrow afternoon with the exception of the machines upon which Count de Lesseps is to perform. The noted French aviator arrived here this morning and ever since has been occupied in expressing his personal opinion of the Customs House officials, railways, steamships, and other known methods of conveyance. The Count has not yet been able to find even his clothes accordingly it looks as if tomorrow's program, which has not been definitely fixed, will be mainly contributed by the four Wright aviators, Brookers, Johnstone, Lachapelle and Coffy, Miljen, the man brought from France to operate the aeroplane owned by James Carruthers, of Montreal, and McCurdy, of Cape Breton. Count de Lesseps visited the aviation field this morning and at once demanded that certain changes be made in order to safeguard the public, and these are now being made.

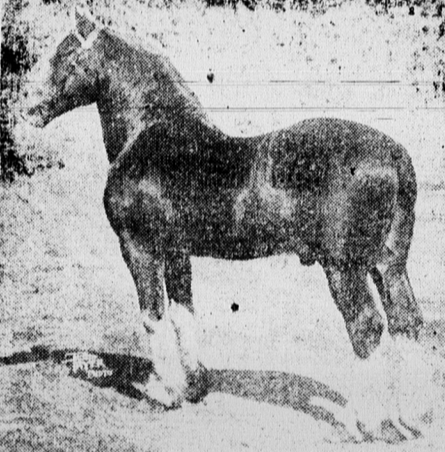

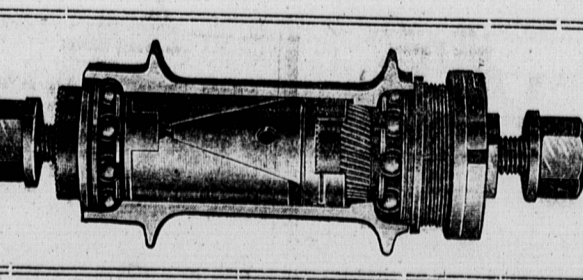
