## BRITAIN WILL ATTENDANCE AT NOT ACT AS WEMBLEY DIS- GUARANTOR OR APPOINTING

### Of Any European Security Pact Except one German West Frontier

LONDON, May 29.—Great Britain will decline, politely but firmly, the request of France that she act as guarantor of any European security pact, except one covering Germany's western frontier.

This means that England will not assume responsibility for Germany's eastern frontier as France has desired, for the sake of Poland and Czechoslovakia.

The draft of the proposed French reply to the German security offer suggested that arbitration pacts be concluded by Germany with Poland and Czechoslovakia, to cover the eastern frontier. When a copy of the draft was submitted to Britain, the cabinet rejected asking whether France proposed to commit herself alone or all the Allies.

As a result of the French rejoinder, Britain suggested that the note represent the joint Allied view. With that idea the cabinet is now preparing a memorandum to France suggesting amendments to the draft note. It is learned the memorandum will make clear that England is not able to act as guarantor of Germany's eastern frontier.

England will propose that Germany effect arbitration treaties with Poland and Czechoslovakia, these treaties to be registered with the League of Nations. Thus, as England is a member of the League, she will become responsible, jointly with the other league nations, for enforcement of the treaties.

## For Repeal of Income Tax Lien Amendment

OTTAWA, May 29.—The Income tax lien is to be repealed. J. A. Robb, acting Minister of Finance, intends to bring down a bill to repeal the amendment to the Income war tax act, passed last session, creating a lien. This amendment provided that any assessed tax, interest or penalty unpaid after date of mailing of the assessment should constitute a lien upon the assets of the taxpayer, notwithstanding lack of notice or registration of publication.

## No Word Yet Of Amundsen

MOSCOW, May 29.—Russia's wireless stations which range along the top of the world have been kept constantly on the alert with operators working earphones night and day striving without result to pick up some news of the explorer Amundsen who attempted to lead an Arctic flight of two planes to the North pole a week ago.

BRIGHTON, England, May 29.—Chancellor of the Exchequer R. Churchill's silk tax, as announced in his recent budget, was denounced today when Dr. Percy Hall, of Mount Vernon Hospital, London, told the Congress of Royal Institute in Public Health, the silk tax dealt a blow to the health of the women in England.

## Ch'Town-Boston Steamship Service

## CENSURE VOTE AGAINST BIL. SPEAKER

It substituted Czechoslovakia for Russia as a required participant and specified that the United States, Japan, Britain, France, Italy and Belgium must be among the fourteen. The other seven, must include one Latin-American state.
