NEW BUTTER FACTORY.—A new co-operative butter factory has been organized at Wellington and will be open for business by the middle of June. It is stated that this will be one of the largest and most modern butterplants in the province. The district served by this factory includes, St. Nicholas, Mount Carmel, Wellington and part of Egmont Bay.

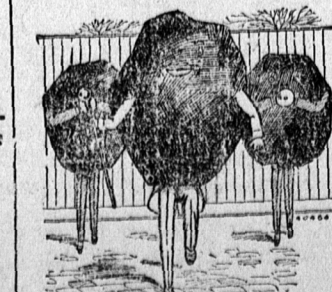

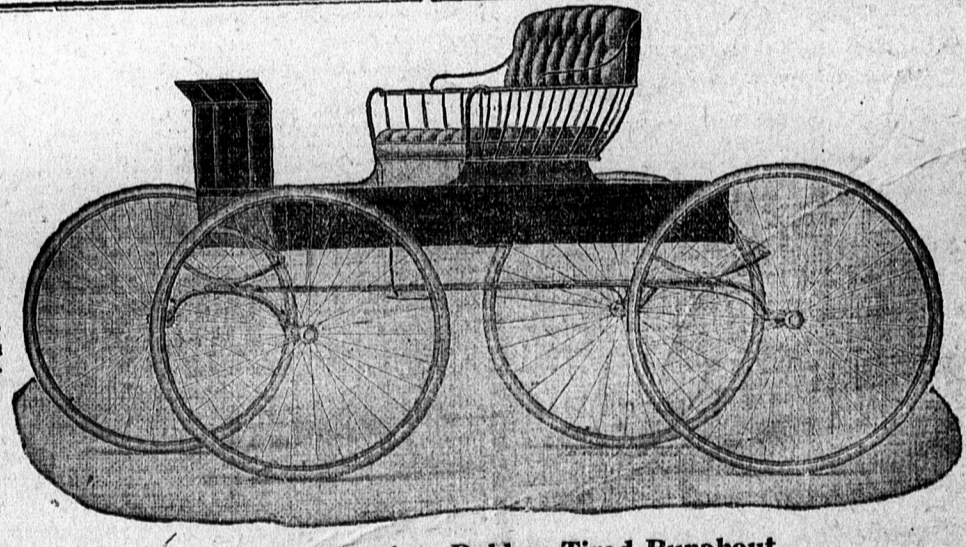
