MILAN, May 4.—It is stated in reference to the Italo-Canadian negotiations that the Italian skin trade is suffering in consequence of the Franco-Canadian treaty. It has been announced in the Chamber of Deputies that England's intervention in the crisis has been invoked, but without success, and unless Canada quickly comes to terms, Italy is resolved to strike a crushing blow at the Canadian smoked fish trade.

### GREAT RUSH TO MARRY IN FRANCE.

LONDON, May 4.—Since the promulgation of the French marriage law of 1907 there have been more weddings in France than at any period since the beginning of the last century with the exception of the years 1831 and 1872, in the former of which men married hoping to escape service in the army, while in the latter many weddings took place which had been delayed by the war with Germany.

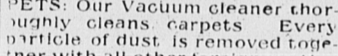

### HOLMER AND LJUNGSTROM.

BUFFALO, May 4.—Hans Holmer, the Halifax runner, by winning the 15-mile running race at the 74th Regiment Armory Saturday, defeated one of the greatest fields of distance men ever brought together. Behind came Frank Nebrich, the Buffalo boy running a surprising race against the cracks opposed to him, and a full lap behind Nebrich was Percy Selten, the Canadian. Holmer's time was 1:21:45, against the world's record of 1:21:24, made by Meadows in Madison Square Garden, New York. Nebrich held Holmer's magnificent pace in splendid style for a mile or so, but the lane was full of running and when he gained the lap on Holmer he seemed to take new life. From this time on Holmer had the race all his own, and it was not long before he was well ahead. ### STORY OF MURDER TOLD

BELFAST, Me., May 4.—Absolving himself from any connection with the death of Mrs. Flattie French Thomas, for which he was under indictment, Sydney P. Bennett, the trial today of Ira Grady, who also is charged with the murder, declared that Mrs. Thomas died following a fight with Grady. When she was staggering away from Grady, after a scuffle, Bennett testified, he noticed blood on her breast, and asked her, "Did he stab you?" She murmured, "I guess so," Bennett said today. Bennett, who is the government's principal witness, occupied the entire afternoon on the stand. His testimony was still unfinished when the supreme court adjourned until tomorrow morning. Bennett testified that he was at Mrs. Thomas' home during the afternoon and evening of the night of the murder. He said Mrs. Thomas played cards and had some liquor, he said. Ira Grady came in at about 7 P. M., and asked Mrs. Thomas to go to Unity, Me., with him as housekeeper. She refused, Bennett testified, and the scuffle ensued, following which she died.

### ROOSEVELT IS WEARY.

COPENHAGEN, May 4.—Ex-President Roosevelt, confessing to being tired, has suggested the shortening of the Copenhagen program. An American election campaign, he says, is in progress. The crown prince replied that the guard died but does not surrender. The program was slightly curtailed.

COBALT, Ont., May 4.—The jury in the inquest into the death of a man in a verdict of death from causes unknown. Gilmour, who was fifty-eight years old, married, and employed at the La Rose mine, jumped off an ore car April 21, sustaining a bad fracture of the left leg, from the effects of which he died April 28.

### NEW YORK BUILDING TO BEAT WORLD

NEW YORK, May 4.—The tallest building in the world, 350 feet higher than the tower on the spire of Metropolitan Life Insurance Company building, is the suggestion of a New York architect for the county court house, which is to be built in City Hall park.

Above the great building the architect, James Rieley Gordon, believes of justice to a stupendous statue, to reach 1,064 feet above the ground, to serve as a beacon light to all Manhattan and to nearby locations on Long Island, New Jersey and Connecticut as well.

An arrangement of electric lights will form an apparent flame ten feet in height, including six circular objects to be placed on the tower, a mammoth flaming torch and the first wetter of land to approaching vessels far out at sea.

The building as designed consists roughly of four circular shafts 520 feet in height, including sixty circular court chambers. There would be twenty-six elevators. He can see no valid objection to the scheme, either as to practicability or engineering problems. "Is it too stupendous for New York?" asks the architect. "Are we still bold enough to continue to lead the structural world?"

### MARTIN'S VIEWS.

LONDON, May 4.—Joseph Martin in a lengthy letter to the Times submits that in view of the political situation the exercise of the royal prerogative cannot be kept out of party discussion, but such discussion must not bring the name of the Sovereign into the domain of party politics because the Sovereign acts on the advice of his ministers. Discussion with a majority of 124, only a few months after a general election would be almost as striking an exercise of the royal prerogative as the creation of a large number of peers for a special object or for the Tories to suggest that their opponents bring the name of the King into the party arena. By proceeding according to the constitution and offering such advice as they think is in the interests of the people they are doing the very thing for which they condemn Asquith.

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### THE LARGEST BATTLESHIP

LONDON, May 4.—The keel of the battleship Princess Royal, the largest warship of any navy in the world, was laid yesterday at Barrow. The vessel will be of 26,000 tons displacement, and over 700 feet long.

The new Dreadnought, the Princess Royal, will have a speed of thirty knots, eight more than the swiftest battleship, the Vanguard.

Today the tenth Dreadnought, the Vindex, was commissioned.

### WRECK OF MAINE WILL BE RAISED.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—After twelve years the ill-fated battleship Maine is to be removed from the Havana harbor, and the bodies which went down with the vessel will be interred in the national cemetery at Arlington. A bill providing for such removal and burial which has passed the House was to-day passed by the Senate.
