**C.I.O. Invades Mine Industry in B. C.**

**VANCOUVER**, May 26—The Committee for Industrial Organization, making its second incursion into British Columbia's \$30,000,000 mining industry, today effected strikes in two mines and prepared to demand recognition for its members in two other properties.

**Less than two months** after the United Mine Workers of America, an affiliate of John L. Lewis' C. I. O., won bargaining rights for its 1,000 members in Fernie without a strike, another C. I. O., branch called strikes in the rich Cariboo district demanding recognition for nearly 400 workers there as members of the international mine, mill and smeltermen's union.

**The strikes** closed the Island Mountain Gold Mines, Ltd., at Barkerville, B. C., where 120 men walked out, and the Cariboo Gold Quartz Mining Company, Ltd., at Wells, B. C., where 240 men quit.

**Egypt Elected League Member**

**(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)**

**GENEVA**, May 26—European diplomats gathered here for League of Nations sessions tonight, saw in an Anglo-French communication to the League an indirect expression of hope that a new Locarno Treaty may be negotiated with Germany and Italy.

**The communication** was the official report of the London and Paris Governments on their recent agreements with Belgium by which they released the little kingdom from some of its obligations under the old Locarno pact.

**The agreement**, designed to stabilize the peace of western Europe, ended when Chancellor Hitler demilitarized the Rhineland last year.

**Earlier the Assembly** unanimously elected Egypt a member of the League of Nations, a status for which she became eligible by reason of the Anglo-Egyptian treaty which recognized her independence.
