**WONDERFUL TRIP OF OCEAN LINER**

French Broke All Records... New Steamer La Provence a Fast One... Wireless Telegraphy... Kept in Constant Communication With Both Sides of Water.

New York, May 5.—The world today says: It is a question whether the officials of the French line are prouder of the wireless telegraph record or the speed record which their new ship, La Provence established on her trip across the Atlantic. She arrived off Sandy Hook at 1.15 p. m. yesterday, having made the run from Havre in six days, nine hours and ten minutes. The old record was six days nine hours and twenty minutes. It was held by La Lorraine. The wireless telegraph record was even more satisfactory than this. It has been the ambition of the Atlantic navigators to carry on communication with both shores of the ocean at the same time, but none of them could quite manage it. The fact remained for the new French ship. The wireless telegraph operative aboard La Provence was in constant communication with Polhu, on the coast of Cornwall, from the time the ship got clear of Havre. The ship was 1,310 miles from Polhu and 1,000 miles from Cape Cod at 2 o'clock last Wednesday morning. The operator in Polhu station at that moment was sending the latest news of the San Francisco disaster to La Provence, to be published in ship's daily newspaper. The dots and dashes were snapping and crackling briskly and the message was flowing smoothly. There was a pause as the operator reached the end of a paragraph. The instrument was silent. Suddenly the dots and dashes began snapping and crackling again, but instead of earthquake news from San Francisco they were spelling out starry details about manhole covers being blown off the sewers in New York's garage district. The operator on La Provence threw over his transmitting switch.

**FRISCO DEATH LIST TO BE 1500**

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—Coroner Walsh said yesterday: "When the debris is cleared away there will be at least 1,000 additions to the death roll. I would not be surprised if the number reached 1,500."

An investigation today demonstrated that the fear that San Francisco will suffer for a period of hard times as an aftermath of the fire is unfounded. Careful estimates made by the authorities competent to speak, show that within the next year there will be more than \$300,000,000 available for the rehabilitation of San Francisco. It is expected that a large part of the money will come from eastern and foreign capitalists.

The vexatious problem of placing the new Chinatown will probably be settled to the satisfaction of the Chinese colony. It is the desire of the municipality not to harass this portion of its foreign population, and the desires of representatives of China will be considered.

The unburned region has been nearly restored to its normal condition, while in the burned area each day brings its added share of improvement and the great task of cleaning up has been fairly started.

**FOUR MEN KILLED BY DYNAMITE**

WOODSTOCK, N.B., May 5.—Five Millville men—Dow Kelly, Harry Johnson, Percy Kennedy, Rainford and Walter Smith—were present at the frightful accident on the Arctostook River, sixteen miles from Masardis, Tuesday morning, resulting in the instant death of four of their fellow workmen. Messrs Kelly and Kennedy were here this afternoon on their way home. When interviewed Mr. Kelly said:

"There were twenty-six men employed by the Ashland Company. On Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock the four men who were fatally injured were chewing dynamite over a fire. There were twenty-five sticks of dynamite in the bunch. We intended using it to loosen a jam of logs as is frequently done by river drivers."

"I do not know what caused the explosion but the noise was something terrific. I was standing about fifteen rods away, but was not injured. Kennedy and another man were knocked down but not hurt much. Trees were levelled. It reminded me of an earthquake."

**GIRL SLEPT FOUR WEEKS**

BELLEVILLE, Ont., May 5.—Edith Latta, fifteen-year-old girl of Capilton, near this city, has for four weeks been almost continually asleep. She is only with great difficulty awakened. She is unable to eat and soon after goes off to sleep again. Doctors think she has an affection of the nerves, from which she may gradually recover.

**REVEAL CRUELTY IN CAUCASUS**

TIFLIS, May 5.—The commission appointed by the viceroy has completed the investigation of the charges made recently by Ashot, the Armenian bishop Shusha, Transcaucasia, who protested against the barbarity of the troops in exterminating the population of that province. The commission reports show many of the horrors were committed during the orgies of Cossacks who were pacifying the Caucasus. In the Kutais province the present conditions were found to be worse than at first reported. Every where there were stories of burning, robbery, the outraging of women and the beating of men. Some instances were cited where wives were outraged in presence of their husbands and before the eyes of their children. The evidence specially condemned General Altkhanoff, the commander of the force in the Kutais province and a certain Col. Nevern. The viceroy has not yet acted upon the report.

LONDON, May 5.—Some harps have been discovered in Egyptian tombs, the strings of which in several instances, were intact, and gave forth distinct sounds after an estimated silence of 3,000 years.

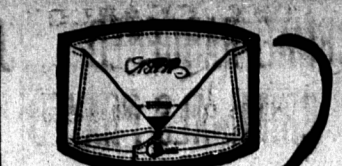

**DREADNAUGHT'S PLANS STOLEN**

LONDON, May 5.—A grave naval scandal has developed over the mysterious disappearance of the plans of the new battleship Dreadnaught. It is believed the plans have been sold to a foreign power by some navy department official. The Government has been trying to keep the matter quiet, but the fact is now established that the plans disappeared a month ago and were returned to the Admiralty through the mail.

Many new methods were employed in the construction of the Dreadnaught which England tried to keep secret in the hope they would put Great Britain several years ahead of other powers in this new style of warship.
