Al Smith Bows To Yanks In 4-3 Victory

NEW YORK, June 9.—(AP)—Cleveland's Al Smith, who twice before had beaten the Yanks in chalking up five straight pitching victories, today bowed to the long-range power of the world champions. The Yankees, sparked by three homers, topped the Indians 4-3 and prevented them from taking over first place in the American League. Home runs by Babe Dahlgren, Joe Dimaggio and George Sluik were the three heaviest blows struck in the six that Smith allowed the Yanks and they accounted for all the champions' runs. The Senators scored three runs in the ninth inning to tie up a game with Chicago but the White Sox won a 4-3 decision in the 11th at Washington. Luke Appling scored the winning run from third on a long fly by Eric McNair. St. Louis Browns, particularly shortstop Johnny Berardino, dove long-range into the cellar with a home-run bombardment that won both games of a twin bill, 8-7 and 4-2, at Philadelphia. The Browns touched three A's pitchers for 14 hits in the 10-inning first game and then got to George Caster and Nelson Potter for eight safeties in the second. Berardino hit homer with none on in both contests. In the second, his four-bagger and one by Roy Cullenbine provided the margin of victory. Saturday Detroit beat Boston Red Sox 4-2 and Cleveland Indians blanked New York Yankees 3-0. Johnny Gerson gained his first major league triumph as the Tigers beat the Sox. He was helped by home runs by Rudy York and Hank Greenberg. At New York, Lefty Al Miller set down the world champions with two hits, both singles. Morris Russo and Johnny Murphy allowed seven blows between them, one a home run by Beau Bell in the ninth. Chicago whipped the Senators 12-6 at Washington in a wild game marked by seven errors, four by the Sox and three by the Senators. At Philadelphia, St. Louis Browns scored seven runs in the fifth inning and live more in the sixth to breeze to a 15-1 victory over the Athletics.

Steady Rush To Enlist Continues In Australia

SYDNEY, Australia, June 10.—(CP Cable)—The steady rush to join the Australian Imperial Force continues daily throughout Australia, men answering the call from the most distant outposts of the Commonwealth. There are now 27,000 men in camps and thousands more have been passed and are winding up their affairs before going to camp. Australia's 7th division is ready to go overseas and ancillary troops to make up an army corps have been fully recruited. The 8th division is filling up rapidly. Air Minister Fairbairn said today that 10 of 21 of the air training schools planned for 1940 have been opened but there has been no hint given yet as to what modification will be necessary in the program in view of the German lightning attack on France.

Reds Irked By Comment On Dodgers Reinforcements

CINCINNATI June 10.—(AP)—The front office of Cincinnati Reds, who are defending and hoping to enlarge upon a national baseball league championship, reported itself today as somewhat irked by sarcastic comment to the effect Brooklyn Dodgers are what they are because of an infiltration of American League cast-offs. The Dodgers are the major immediate obstacles to the Reds' progress. Those who subscribe to the view that the American is the only

major league point to an impressive lot of ex-American Leaguers and say "that proves it." "That," said traveling secretary Gabe Paul, of the Reds, "is a lot of hoop-la." Gabe picked up the box scores in the morning papers and found just as many one-time National League men now are bolstering up one and all teams in the American circuit. Among the random discoveries were: 1. (Inevitable) Zeke Bonura, once the New York Giants problem child now defending first base with might and main for Washington. 2. Dick Bartell, ex-Oleago Cub, now doing all right at short for Detroit. 3. Rollie Hemsey, ex-Red, catching very well for Cleveland. 4. Mike Kreevich, ex-Chicago Cub, outfielding for the other Chicago team. 5. Roy Cullenbine, not good enough for the Dodgers, but now putting some life in the St. Louis Browns. WHAT HAPPENS TO GERMAN FIGS

Farmers should be glad they are not under Nazi domination. Here are the official regulations a Nazi farmer has to comply with before he can use meat from his own pig. He must prove that it is animal was reared and fed on his farm for at least three months. He must apply in writing to the local mayor for a permit to kill it. If this is in order, he must pay a slaughtering tax in advance. When it is killed—he must send his permit back to the mayor. An inspector then appears and weighs the meat. He may now use the meat and fat from his own pig. But he must turn over to the authorities ration coupons for meat and fat representing ninety per cent. of the weight of the animal!

Markets Off On Italy's Entrance Into Conflict

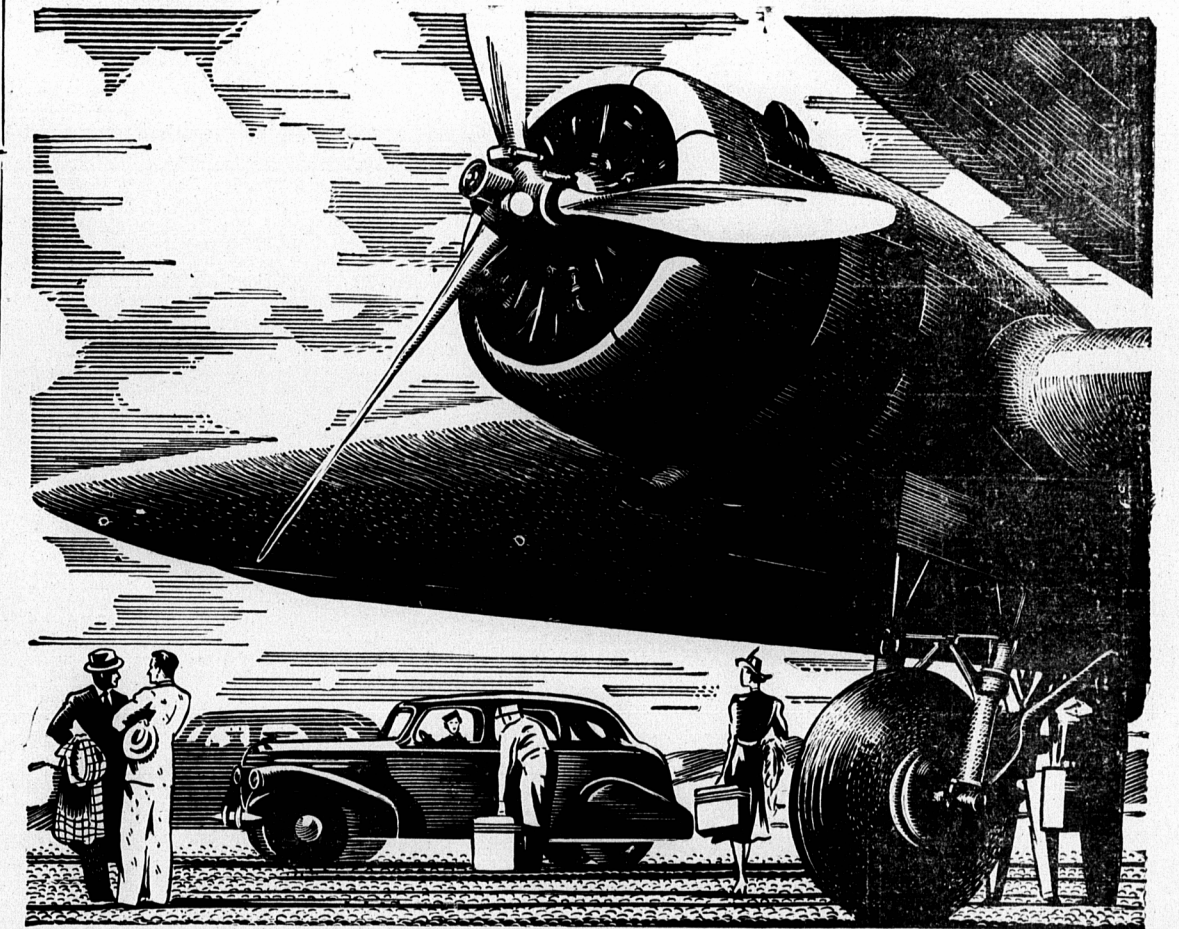
NEW YORK, June 10.—(AP)—Financial markets took the news of Italy's entry into war with a substantial yet orderly sag of prices in securities, but a complete absence of the frightened selling that poured into Wall Street when Germany launched "total war" a month ago. Stocks of leading corporations dropped \$1 to more than \$4 in many instances, but the turnover was only 97,440 shares. In the bond market, losses were comparatively moderate outside the foreign division, where Italian issues fell sharply. Commodity markets were mixed and uncertain. Wheat, finished around a cent a bushel higher, tin and rubber advanced, but cotton was about unchanged, and wool and sugar sagged in futures dealings. In foreign exchange dealings, Allied currencies were lower, but the controlled German and Italian monies were kept at previous rates.

Henry Ford Working On Plane Motor

DETROIT, June 10.—(AP)—Henry Ford, examining a fast United States army pursuit plane to determine its adaptability to mass production methods, disclosed today he is working on a new airplane motor. This 78-year-old automobile manufacturer, who said recently he could build 1,000 standard planes a day under certain conditions, did not describe the new motor in detail. His comment was made as, accompanied by engineers and high officials of the Ford Motor Company, he clambered over and peered into a Curtiss P-40 plane flown here at his request. Of the new motor, which Ford said he believed would be an improvement over present engines, the industrialist said only that it was of simplified construction and was of the Rolls Royce type.
