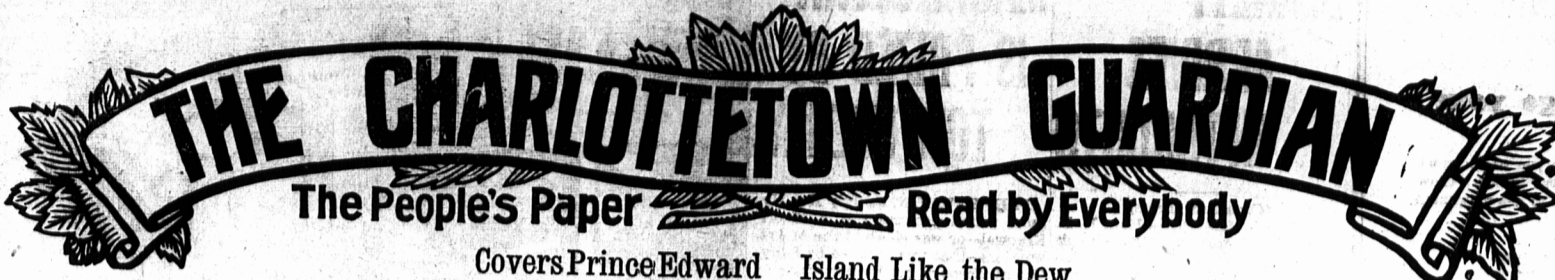

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Disorder In Egypt -- Constitution Suspended For A Period Of Three Years

B. C. ELECTION ENDORSES LEADERSHIP

TORONTO, July 20.—The Conservative victory in British Columbia is taken by local Conservatives as indicating the undoubted confidence of the citizens of Canada in the leadership of Hon. R. B. Bennett, K. C. M. P. As a result, even greater interest is centred on the picnic at Oshawa on Saturday when he will make his first public pronouncement since that notable victory. Hon. R. B. Bennett and Miss Bennett will arrive in Toronto this evening, and will stay at the King Edward Hotel leaving with the motor cavalcade on Saturday morning for Oshawa.

WASHINGTON HEARS FROM ALL BUT TWO

WASHINGTON, July 20.—All but two of the fourteen nations to which Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg submitted his treaty for the renunciation of war have formally apprised the Washington government of their willingness to join in the compact, Japan and Czechoslovakia alone remain to be heard from and the state department has learned through diplomatic channels that they, too, are so favorably inclined that their acceptance may be expected within a few days. TEXT OF CANADIAN GOV'TS REPLY

OTTAWA, July 19.—The government of Canada cordially accepts the revised treaty for the renunciation of war and is prepared to participate in its signature. This is the tenor of the official reply made by Canada to the United States government's proposals for a treaty outlawing war. The reply, which was handed to Hon. William Phillips, United States Minister, at Ottawa, for transmission to his government, on July 16, is very brief. It reads as follows:—"Sir:—I desire to acknowledge your note of June 23rd and the revised draft which it contained of the treaty for the renunciation of war and to state that His Majesty's government in Canada cordially accepts the treaty as revised and is prepared to participate in its signature, accept, Sir, the renewed assurance of my highest consideration." (Signed) W. L. MacKenzie King, secretary of state, for external affairs.

CANADIAN TRADE COMMISSIONER VISITS CITY

Mr. H. A. Scott, Canadian Government Trade Commissioner at Liverpool, whose territory includes the North of England, Lancashire, North Midlands and North Wales, was in the city yesterday. While here, he called on several of the leading exporters of goods to the North of England. He also discussed with them the prospects of developing a market in that locality for Canadian goods, such as wool, cotton, and other commodities. Mr. Scott stated that the Canadian Department of Trade and Commerce maintains fully staffed offices in twenty-four centres in Europe. These offices are essentially for business and are run on business lines. It is their aim to find larger markets for Canadian products and to promote their sale. According to it is their object to give all the assistance possible to Canadian producers in their endeavour to increase the sales of their goods in foreign countries, and they invite inquiries and submit the co-operation of the exporters in working towards that end.

ELECTORAL SELF-GOVERNMENT TEMPORARILY ABOLISHED

Law And Order Unsafe In Egypt. -- King Fuad Begged To Suspend Parliament For Three Years To Save Country From Despotie Faction Rule. -- Egyptian Ministers Will Now Receive Instructions From London.

CAIRO, July 20.—Both houses of parliament were suspended for three years or longer if deemed necessary by a royal decree published this evening. The king and his ministers are invested with full legislative authority. Press immunity is likewise suspended indefinitely. The decree was signed by the king and Her Majesty, placed upon the throne by all his ministers. The waft campaign of the Belt Provinces is prohibited, and extensive police and military measures have been taken for the maintenance of security and order. The premier's letter to the king was published, in which the king was begged to take the measure mentioned in the interests of the Egyptian people. The government to save the country from the despotism of the corrupt faction which has succeeded in dominating the majority and creating chaos throughout the country. Prisoner Attempts To Shoot Way Out

NEW YORK, July 20.—A spectacular attempt by a prisoner to shoot his way out of the Bronx county jail tonight ended in the killing of two keepers and the death of a prisoner, who killed himself when a door he was unable to open prevented his escape. The jail building was thrown into an uproar when John McCabe, a prisoner, who was armed with two revolvers released 100 prisoners from their cells into the enclosure. McCabe first attacked Keeper Morris Broderon, 53, who fell with a bullet wound in the abdomen and died 20 min. later. Taking the keeper's keys, the prisoner made his way to the third floor tier where he met Keeper Dan Horgan, 34 years old. Horgan was unarmed, fell with a bullet through his heart. The prisoner ran to a door leading to a fire escape. Falling in an attempt to shoot off the lock, he pressed a pistol to his temple and killed himself. Police reserves surrounded the block to prevent escapes.

Grenadier Guards Band To Tour Maritimes

MONTREAL, July 20.—The band of the Canadian Grenadier Guards will leave Montreal July 27th for an extended tour of the Maritime Provinces. It will be the first Canadian or old country military band to tour these Provinces since 1912. The itinerary has been arranged as follows: New Glasgow, July 28; Charlottetown, July 30; Moncton, July 31; Truro, Aug. 1; Halifax, Aug. 2; Digby, Aug. 3; Kentville, Aug. 4; Yarmouth, Aug. 6; Saint John, Aug. 7 and 8; Fredericton, Aug. 9; Sherbrooke, Que. Aug. 10. The band is to return to Montreal on the morning of Aug. 11.

INQUIRY INTO DEATH OF CAPT. LOEWENSTEIN

BOULOGNE-SUR-MER, France, July 20.—Finding out of the body of Captain Alfred Loewenstein, missing Belgian millionaire, cleared up most of the grim mystery surrounding his disappearance from a cross-Channel airplane July 4. French and Belgian authorities will still have to determine whether the body was accidentally shot down from the plane as it flew 4,000 feet over the English Channel, or whether the financier had deliberately wrenched open the exit door and plunged to his death. But the rumors that the financier had perpetrated a gigantic hoax and was still alive were definitely set at rest by the finding of the body. The body was found floating face downward ten miles off the Cape Gris Nez by a Boulogne fishing smack, Captain Jean Marie Beaugrand, and was readily identified by a wrist watch engraved "Captain Loewenstein, 35 Rue de La Science, Brussels." Otherwise the body was unrecognizable as it was in an advanced stage of decomposition. The body was clothed only in under drawers, socks and shoes, the latter bearing the name of an English maker. There was a severe wound in the abdomen and both feet were broken.

All Known Survivors Safe In Harbour
