YESTERDAY IN THE LEGISLATURE

WEDNESDAY, March 30.

The House opened at noon. Before the orders of the day were called Mr. Palmer rose to take the earliest opportunity of making a statement concerning himself, the House and the constituency which he had the honor to represent. During the recess, in the absence of the Attorney General at Pictou on public business, the latter had by wire retained him and Mr. Wheat to attend to the crown business in the court then about to sit and which the Attorney General could not attend. He (Mr. Palmer) accordingly took charge of several important cases including the well-known Gillian case. In doing this he believed he was well within his rights and was not violating any law of the Province or doing anything not entirely honorable and right. There were well-known precedents for doing as he did. Afterwards the question came up whether he had not entered into a contract which was a technical violation of the Independence of Parliament. Writs were issued against Mr. Wheat and himself. In order to assure himself the Attorney General called together the legal members of the House, and while they were satisfied that no breach of the law had been committed they thought it well to further assure themselves by consulting eminent counsel abroad. They were advised by such counsel that if the English law prevailed in Prince Edward Island he, (Mr. P.) was strictly within his rights. But in Ontario a like case had been decided otherwise, while in Nova Scotia the law puts members of the legal profession who are members of Parliament on the same footing as they are in England. He himself believed he was acting strictly within his rights. He had no thought of violating the law and acted in perfect good faith. If there was one act which ought to be regarded with reverence by members of the House it was the Independence of Parliament. Act. The issue came before the Supreme Court in the case against Mr. Wheat, and was argued on demurrer, and by a carefully considered judgment of the Chief Justice in which the other judges concurred it was decided that counsel here were not on the same footing as in England, that the retention by the Attorney General constituted a contract and that penalties might be sued for and recovered. He did not know whether it was the intention of these taking action against him to proceed further, but he felt he was standing in the same position as Mr. Wheat. He had asked himself, could Mr. Wheat, had he not been appointed postmaster, have come here and taken his seat? If Mr. Wheat could not do so he felt that he ought not to do so. He was in the same position as Mr. Wheat and did not see how he could properly continue to sit and vote. Lawmakers should not be law-breakers. He bowed to the decision of the court, and felt there was nothing for him to do but to retire. He was extremely sorry, not for himself but for his many constituents who would by the action of the Opposition, be left in part unrepresented for the balance of this session, and probably till after the next general election, as this might be the last session of the present House. They would still however be ably represented by his colleague, the Commissioner of Public Works, and he would himself further their interests in every way in his power outside the House. In conclusion he thanked Mr. Speaker and the members for their courtesy to him while a member of the House and then withdrew amid cheers.
