THE CITY HAS POWER.

For the better understanding of those who may not be conversant with the chartered powers and rights of the city, and in order that they may vote the more intelligently at the coming plebiscite it may be stated that the city has at present full power to establish a lighting plant. In the 112th section, subsection 15 of the Act of 1903, consolidating and amending the Incorporation Act, the city Council is thus empowered in the following words: (15) "To provide for defraying out of the funds of the said city, if necessary, the expense of lighting the same or any part thereof with gas, electricity, oil, or other substances, and the performing of any kind of work required for the purpose of supplying the said city with light, and for obliging the proprietors or occupiers of real property to allow such work to be done, and fixtures placed in or about their premises, such work and fixtures to be done at the expense of the city, and for the erection of all works connected therewith, or necessary to provide light for the inhabitants of the said city; to provide for the erection, preservation and security of lamp-posts, sign-boards and other fixtures, and generally to make all such laws as may be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the powers herein or hereinafter vested in the said City Council, or any department of office therein, subject to the limitation with regard to penalties contained and prescribed in and by this Act."

It will be observed that the City Council has ample power in this matter to proceed, and would require no new legislation except to authorize the issue of debentures after the citizens in public meeting have voted their approval of the expenditure to be undertaken. It is for our merchants and citizens to say whether our position would not be improved by such authorization, notably in any negotiations they may have with the Light and Power Company, either as to purchasing a part or the whole of the Company's plant, or in making a further contract with the company for street lighting.

The London County Council is making great strides in rehousing the poor. Some 4,000 tenements have been constructed, and the plans involve the ultimate housing of 98,000 people at a cost of nearly \$38,000,000. It is expected that the interest of this cost will be more than met by the rentals, while these tens of thousands of people will have clean, comfortable, healthful homes which will be almost palatial when compared with their former places of abode.

Formerly there were many imperial garrisons throughout Canada. Many of these were withdrawn shortly after confederation. Within the past few years all that remained were about 1,800 men at Halifax and 600 at Esquimaux. Now these are also being taken away and with them the greater portion of the naval squadrons hitherto stationed at the same two ports. Canada will then be in a most defenceless condition so far as regular soldiers make for defence, but still a tolerable safe country to live in.

Although England is but a small country there is much difference in the rainfall and the amount of sunshine in different parts of the kingdom. The London Daily Telegraph tells in 1903 the rainfall at Stye, in Cumberland county in the course of the twelve months was about 223 inches, which was nearly ten times as great as the minimum rainfall of the year at Beachy Head, where only a little over 24 inches fell. Imagine a rainfall equal to one foot six inches per month, and but a short distance away, as we count distance in this country, a fall of but two inches per month. In almost any part of England there is much greater precipitation than we have in Canada, and proportionally less sunshine. There are portions of England where the hours of sunshine average no more than three and a third daily throughout the year.

The wobbling Patriot boasts of the things it advocated in the days when Hon. David Laird was its editor. No doubt its readers are sighing from time to time for a return of the days of Mr. Laird. But let that pass. We are now told that The Patriot advocated among other things an improved telegraph service, sewerage and temperance before The Guardian was in existence. Our recollection is of a Patriot that cold-shouldered the improved telegraph service until the battle was nearly won; that boldly championed the license system when The Guardian was advocating prohibition; and that opposed the introduction of sewerage on the grounds that the sewers would freeze in winter, that the emanations from the pipes would spread disease broadcast, while the discharge into the harbor would poison the fish and destroy the bathing. There is scarcely a question of public interest outside of party politics on which The Patriot has not wobbled from side to side. It opposed sewerage; it approves of it now. It now supports prohibition, but fought for licences with much greater energy only a few years ago. Such a wobbling course can never win the respect of the community.
