—TOWN COUNCIL.—The regular meeting of Town Council, Summerside took place Monday evening in the Town Building, Mayor Campbell presiding with a full attendance of Councillors. The usual business was transacted and each committee gave splendid reports. Some time ago the Chief Fire Marshal, was in Summerside, and reported perfect satisfaction in connection with the working of the "Beaver" fire engine. In reference to the electric light system it was under the former officers, namely decided to charge the householders the same rate as they paid the Sun Electric Co. Councillor Allen moved that a permit be granted that before any building be moved the owner shall deposit a sum sufficient to cost of cutting wires, cables, etc. Second: In the future the electric light if not paid within 10 days of notice will be shut off. July 51 cattle, 25 sheep, 4 hogs 1 hog condemned, 4 parts of lamb were condemned parasitic.

—TO INVESTIGATE GRAIN HANDLING.

—LONDON, August 15.—Baill Murray, director of the Australian producers co-operative federation, will go to Canada while the next Canadian wheat crop is being moved to investigate the method of handling by grain growers and other Canadian co-operative associations. The producers' federation, which represents competitive farmers' distributing companies in Australia and does an annual business of over one hundred million dollars, has just established an office in London and will also have a branch in Canada to buy Canadian agricultural machinery, fencing and other goods. It hopes to sell Australian hides and wool direct to Canadian leather and woolen manufacturers.

—Mr. Murray told your correspondent that Sir James Connolly, of Australia, after visiting Canada reported very favorably of the work of the farmers co-operative organizations in the Dominion. This had given quite a fillip to the co-operative movement in Australia and in west Australia the Westralian farmers' association had been entrusted by the Government with handling the crop.

CONDITIONS ON WHICH BRITAIN WILL RECOGNIZE SOVIET GOVERNMENT

PARIS, August 15.—Conditions which Great Britain has stipulated as a basis for recognition of the Russian Soviet Government are given in a Moscow despatch received here. Cessation of hostilities is said to be the first condition, while the others are repatriation of prisoners, an understanding concerning reparations for damages to property of private citizens, and acceptance by Great Britain of the Russian conditions, concerning resumption of commercial relations between the two countries. M. Tchitcherine, the Bolshevik Foreign Minister, adds the des-

patch, has advised Leo Kamenov, at London, that the Moscow Government considers these conditions as the basis for peace negotiations between Russia and Great Britain.
