Germans are Laying Plan for New War

(Special to The Guardian.) NEW YORK, Nov. 22—The militarists in Germany already are preparing for another war, George Clemenceau, war premier of France, declared tonight in the first address of his American tour.

"Do you read the newspapers? Don't you know what that means?"

The Tiger of France, speaking fervently before a packed house, reviewed the situation in Europe, pointing to the Turks and Soviet Russia as ominous war clouds.

In the meantime, he declared, Ludendorff and other German militarists were planning a coup against the democratic government there. Describing the present as time of "greatest crisis," he urged that the United States should renew conversations with France and England which, without definitely committing this country to any set program, would present to German eyes a picture of the three unpleasant folks who faced her in the war. He said sooner or later, the United States would have to interest herself in the post-war affairs of Europe, because she could not continue to be comfortable and wealthy if Europe was covered with blood.

Criticizes U. S.

He expressed hope that the United States might establish a plan as to what was to be done in carrying out the terms of the peace treaty and join with England and France in imposing it on Germany. He was frank in his criticism of the United States post war attitude, declaring that America had had a large share in imposing the peace terms and had a duty to see that they were enforced.

Challenging the worth of Germany's signature to a treaty, the Tiger declared that if France had known in 1918 that reparations would have been unpaid four years later, she would have gone on to Berlin.

The Tiger received a great burst of applause for the assertion.

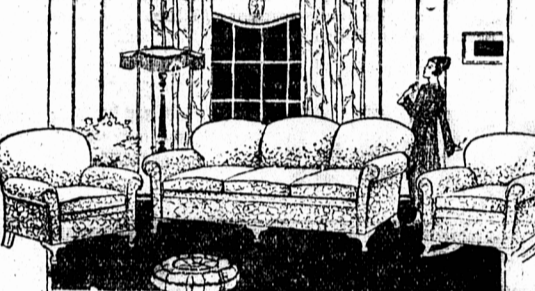
