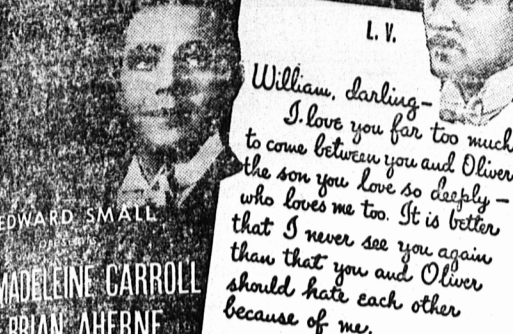

OTTAWA, July 22 (AP)—A draft of the operations of the proposed unemployment insurance legislation under dominion auspices was presented today to the special committee studying the government bill. The committee learned from experts of the labor department that the administrative cost which would be borne by the dominion, would approximate \$3,250,000 a year, or about \$2.50 for each insured person. Total contributions to the fund for 1941 are estimated at \$38,500,000 of which \$9,000,000 would be contributed by the government, the remainder in about equal shares between employers and employees. About 25 per cent of the persons to be insured would be women. An advantage the Canadian worker would enjoy over his corresponding worker in the United States, would be that he would pay about \$13 against \$38. He would have to wait nine days only after losing his job before receiving benefits. In the United States the time of waiting is 14 days. Coincidentally with the establishment of unemployment insurance administration in the United States would set up employment bureaux virtually taking over from the provinces the entire employment responsibility. Establishing a precedent the committee invited Senators to ask questions of witnesses and two senators were on hand. The opening day's sitting was taken up with explanations of various phases of the bill by experts of the labor department. Gerald Brown, assistant to the Deputy Minister of Labor, made some comparisons between the present bill and the act passed in 1936 and later declared unconstitutional. He pointed out that the proposed act taking in 2,100,000 workers covered more territory than the former act which included about 1,600,000. Total number of wage earners covered under the act of 1936, stood at 2,700,000.

Mr. Brown estimated the personnel necessary to administer the act at 1,000. He noted that the act would also operate as a body of employment agents, he explained. He added the bill did not take power from local agencies to deal with their own unemployment but it was thought the provinces would give up their unemployment responsibility to the dominion government.

Mr. Heaps, formerly Co-operative Comptroller member for Winnipeg North, and now attached to the labor department, set forth the cost of administration of the proposed act in Canada at about \$2.50 per insured person as against \$3.70 in the United Kingdom and \$2.10 in the United States. Under the act of 1936, he noted, the cost had been estimated at about \$4.76 per person.

Woman Proves Ability With Rifle

By D. E. BURDITT Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, July 22.—(CP)—Dr. Edith Summerskill who is just 40, has proved her ability as a soldier in her way into membership in the palace of Westminster Rifle Club—and probably the House of Commons unit of Local Defence Volunteers.

It was more of a moral victory accomplished by the club member for she is not only for herself but for British women in general who have been agitating for weeks to join the men in their Local Defence Volunteer units.

So it was up to Dr. Summerskill to prove the men were wrong. She had never fired a gun in her life but she had been on a rifle range. She had imagined rifle shooting a real he-man's job. Still, she was willing to try the right thing and to defend themselves and their homes. If women were to claim equality with men they must be able to shoulder equal burdens and dangers.

Ears were cocked to hear what she had to say, but the men merely turned their backs on the idea of women being armed.

The women argued that a lot of female shots had won rifle fame for themselves, including Marjorie Foster, who captured the King's Prize at Bisley. The men argued that they were women.
