Surrendering to the Victorious British

A CANADIAN SOLDIER

Dead at Bloemfontein—Lipton's Company—Powerful Coming to Halifax.

HUNDRETS OF BOERS SURRENDER.

LONDON, May 29.—(Special)—Pietermaritzburg announces the surrender of ninety Boers, chiefly officials.

Two hundred more surrendered at Palappe in Bechuanaland, while forty two wagon loads of men, women and children surrendered at Fort Tuli in Rhodesia.

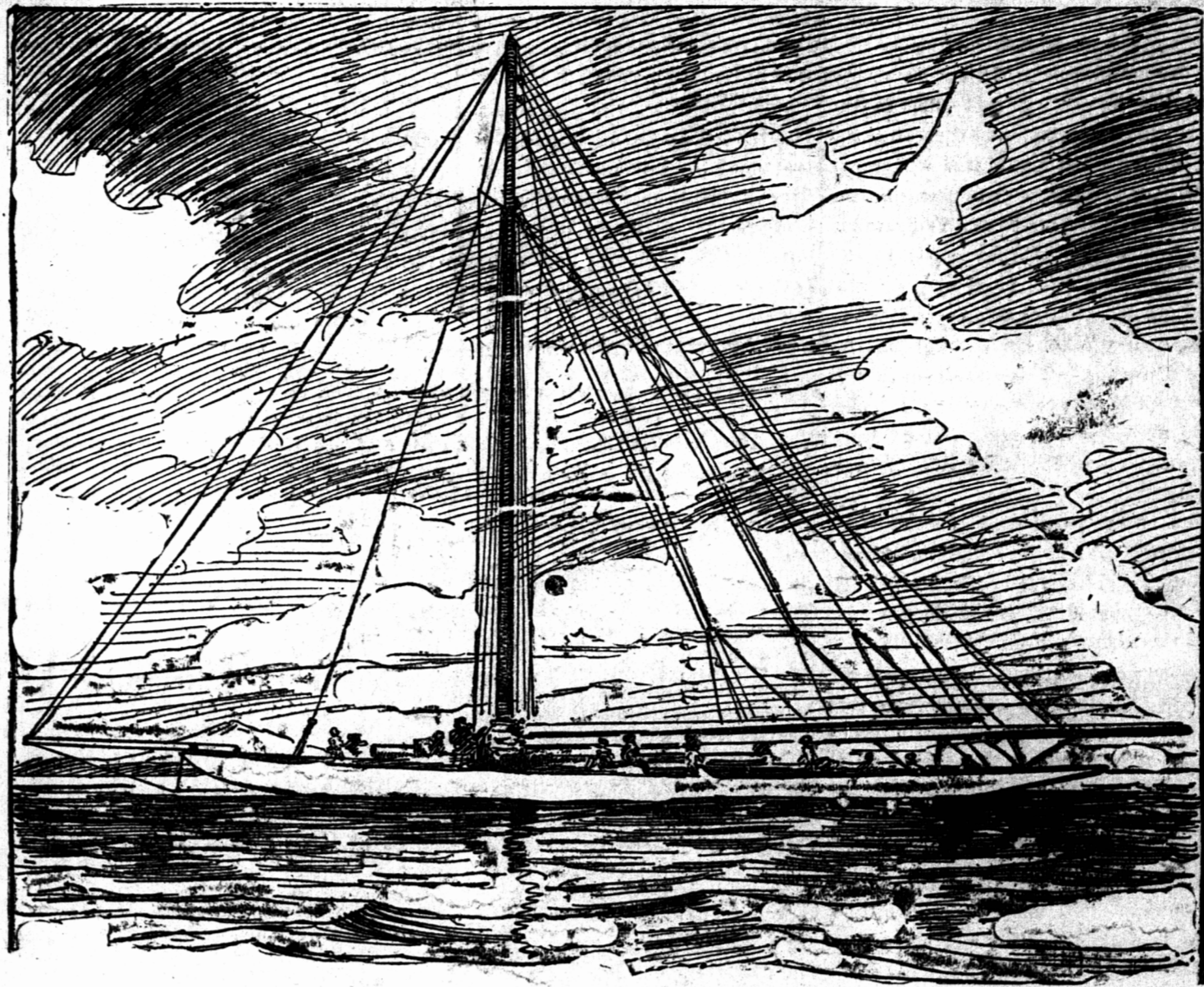

DIRECT STEAMER

The Steamer Micmac to Sail From Ch'town.

IN MONTH OF AUGUST.

Details Being Arranged and Regular Trips Will be During Season

For some months past negotiations have been in progress to obtain direct steamship communication between this port and Liverpool.

In conversation with Mr. N. Rattenbury yesterday afternoon THE GUARDIAN learned that in the course of a few days complete arrangements will be made with Messrs J. W. Carmichael & Co. whereby the steamer Micmac will make the first trip from this port in August and will continue regular sailings during the remainder of the season.

The promoters of direct steamship communication point out that the success of the project will depend largely upon the shippers of the Province. In order to retain the service all should patronize the steamer by having not only exports but imports carried by this line. The direct service will be found to be invaluable to those wishing to send cheese, eggs, etc. direct to the markets of Europe. Merchants will also find it convenient to have their goods shipped direct in the same way.

It is to be noted that the new arrangement is made practicable by an increased grant obtained during the session just closed, strong representations to that end having been made by Mr. Horace Hazard and others to Sir Louis Davies who finally succeeded in having the increased subsidy voted. The continuance of the steamer during future seasons will no doubt depend very largely upon the amount of direct traffic which is developed this year, a point which those interested in seeing the service continued will do well to bear in mind.

The Steamer Micmac, which it is expected will be placed on the route, was built in 1893. She is 300 feet in length, 40 feet 5 inches beam and her gross tonnage is 2502, the net tonnage being 1900 tons. The ship is represented as being especially adapted to the requirements of the service between the Island and the Mother Country.
