### ASKS VOTE ON THE PROPOSAL

AMHERST, N. S., May 25.—Prior to accepting the appointment as provisional president of the re-affiliated Maritime branch of the A. A. U. C., D. Webster Fraser, of Amherst, will first call a meeting on Wednesday, June 7, in Amherst, when the clubs will be requested to vote upon the proposal. On the existing conditions in these provinces, Mr. Fraser intimated tonight that he would not accept the proposal unless a unanimous vote before he could consider the position.

Notices are being prepared within the next two days and will be forwarded to every club in the east, with the request that they send delegates to the meeting or else submit a sincere expression of general opinion.

Mr. Fraser, in speaking to the Saint John Telegraph-Journal correspondent, intimated that if he received his appointment from the Maritime clubs that he would at once recommend the reinstatement of S. At the same time he stated that

counties.

of the famous Pictou county all-  
star team. His throwing arm  
from the outfield was then the  
envy of many senior outfielders.  
As an announcer he is well known  
in all parts of the province. He  
was president of the central sec-  
tion, M. A. A. last season and in  
1924 guided the destinies of the  
Amherst Amateur Athletic Associa-  
tion. He has been a delegate at  
many meetings of the M. P. B. A.  
A. U. C., and has officiated as  
judge, timer and starter at numer-  
ous eastern track meets.

Mr. Fraser is well qualified to  
deal with sport affairs and there is  
a general hope that he will accept  
the position given him by Colonel  
N. P. MacLeod of Saint John.

**MILES WINS 15 MILE GLACE**  
**BAY CLASSIC AND BEATS DEMAR**

GLACE BAY, N. S., May 24.—  
Johnny Miles, Sydney Mines, won  
a 15-mile classic at the Black Diam-  
ond Track here this afternoon, de-  
cisively defeating a field which in-  
cluded Clarence DeMar, 1927 Bos-  
ton Marathon winner, James Hen-  
nigan, U. S. National 10-mile cham-  
pion and Silas McLellan, of Wind-  
sor, N. S.

Miles' time was 1 hour, 25 min-  
utes, 7 1/2 seconds.  
Hennigan was second McLellan  
third.

An immense crowd estimated at  
over 10,000 crowded into the park  
to witness the event. Bundled up in  
overcoats the spectators shivered  
as the runners circled the half  
mile track, swept by a bitter north  
east wind from the sea. The full  
force of the gale struck the run-  
ners at the half way mark, and  
considering this fact, the time  
made was excellent.

### Montreal Civic

### Government Censured

**BY STAR OVER THEIR NE-**  
**GLECT TO ENFORCE**  
**PASTEURIZATION**

The Montreal Star commenting  
on the Typhoid epidemic says:  
"There is no language to character-  
ize such carelessness, such callous-  
ness, such flagrant and deadly ne-  
glect as the Civic Government is  
guilty of."

The first epidemic should have  
been warning enough. But the  
head of the Civic Government met  
infuriated deputations with the  
statement that there was no Epide-  
mic.

The Health Department did all  
they could, but they were starved  
by the Executive Committee. Not  
a single New Pasteurization In-  
spector was given to the Over-Driven  
Health Department, and another  
epidemic has followed on the first.

It has happened again in the  
face of the admitted fact that proper  
pasteurization would have pre-  
vented it. There may possibly be an  
element of misfortune in a city be-  
ing caught off its guard once af-  
ter a period of apparent immunity.

But To Be Caught Twice, And  
To Be Caught in The Same Plants  
Which Should Have Been Watched  
As A Cat Watches a Mouse.

Just as long as citizens of Mon-  
treal are content to put up  
with this kind of government, this  
is the kind of government they will  
get. And They Will Pay The  
Price in Epidemics, Filth, Disease,  
Death, Blackened Reputations,  
abroad And Ruined Trade At  
Home.

To economize with tea, place the  
tea on a sheet of white paper and  
warm it in the oven before brew-  
ing it. Less tea is required when  
it is treated in this manner.

Before polishing furniture that is  
very dirty, wring out a cloth from  
very hot water and rub it over the  
surface. Wipe dry at once. Then  
apply the cream in the usual way,  
and a very high polish will be ob-  
tained which will not show finger  
marks.

To remove old tea and coffee  
stains, cover with glycerine, let  
stand three hours, then wash with  
soap and cold water. Repeat if ne-  
cessary.
