Warm Days Bring Many Garden Chores

This is a hard month on most of us humans. Just as the plants are suffering from the hot sun and warm airless nights, just as we are ourselves, it is up to us to carry our plant children successfully through this trying period.

Diseases and insects will choose these days for their blitzkriegs and a close watch will have to be maintained if they are to be held in check.

Look over the Nasturtiums, Roses, Tomato plants, and other garden plants for aphids. These may be black, red, or green, but they will be present on the stem, buds, young foliage and the undersides of the leaves, and the affected plants will appear generally unthrifty. A thorough soaking of nicotine solution should be applied as often as necessary to control them. Many ready-mixed spray preparations for the control of aphids are today available.

Hand-pick Tomato worms as soon as they appear and no spray will be needed for them. They destroy foliage so rapidly that they are easily found despite their protective coloring.

Cabbages need constant watching for the small green worms which are the offspring of the innocent-looking white and yellow cabbage butterfly. A pyrethrum spray is best and easiest for these during this season when the plants are hurrying along toward maturity and must not be treated with poison. Cabbage worms are reported to be very active in Manitoba this year.

Look over your grounds for any bank or corner where weeds have been neglected and pull them out after the ground has been well moistened either with rain or through the medium of the garden hose. Left to themselves they will rapidly spread their seeds broadcast, and give you all sorts of work in the future.

Shallow cultivation of the soil is doubly important during these days of excessive heat. A careful, dry crust makes hard growing for the flowers. But be careful not to disturb the surface roots when pulverizing the soil to hold every drop of moisture. Delphiniums, Roses, Snapdragons, etc., should be cut back after their profuse flowering to assure late-summer bloom.

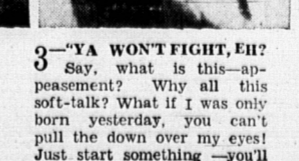
