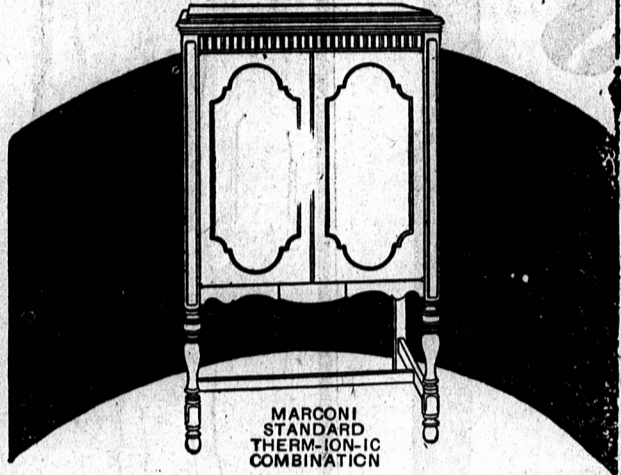

### JUDGES STRONGLY OPPOSED

QUEBEC, Sept. 9.—Premier Taschereau this afternoon declared himself unalterably opposed to any change in the present method of appointing Judges in Canada. Speaking at a luncheon of the Canadian Bar Association, he voiced a view diametrically opposed to that expressed during the morning in the Presidential address of Hon. Wallace Nesbitt, who proposed a change which would take appointment of Judges out of the sphere of politics.

The Premier also defended the present custom of appointing Commissions to take care of matters which were formerly adjudicated upon by Judges of the Superior Court. Referring to a few of the momentous problems confronting the legal profession today, Premier Taschereau cited first and foremost that of a growing disrespect for the law. He would hesitate to declare that indignant lawlessness was on the increase, but if it were the causes were to be found in the multiplicity of laws which attempt to regulate the innermost life of the citizen.

"True," he continued, "law is law, and must be obeyed. But, where it invades the home and—without referring to any legislation or to any country in particular—dictates what, when and where you shall eat and drink, at what speed you shall travel, how many birds or fish you are permitted to bag, does not the transgressor feel that by infringing any of these laws he is not sinning against God or his conscience? Can it be said that all these laws to disrespect and lawlessness? Please bear in mind that I am not condemning such legislation as is necessary in our modern life—Quebec has its full share of such laws—but a breach in a trifling matter leads to a more serious breach in important cases."

Referring to appointment of Judges the Premier said: "The momentous problem with the Bench is, in our days, the recruiting of Judges. I wonder if at an early date conscription will not have to be resorted to, and certainly it is not popular with us. The reason of the difficulty for finding recruits for the Bench is obvious. Legal talents, at the Bar, command large incomes, and our Judges are underpaid."

### THE INADEQUACY OF THE COUNTRY SCHOOL

In the effort put forth in recent years to discover what is wrong with the open country that its sons and daughters should show such an eagerness to escape from the green fields among which they were born, the school has been subjected to criticism as a contributing factor in the drift of rural youth from the country to the city. Before both the Canadian and American Commissions the present day system of education was charged with being a cause of migration from the country to the city.

The country child has three inalienable rights. He has an equal right with the city child to a good education; then he has a right to be able to receive that education without having to go from home; and he has a right to the kind of education which will most effectively prepare him for the work in life he is to do.

It is difficult to respect these rights in the average one room school. In the first place, the schools are frequently out of date, unattractive, poorly lighted and ventilated. The inexperienced or unsuccessful teacher gravitates into the weaker communities, which of all places are most in need of trained and capable leadership. Then there is added to this the little group of pupils running often to not more than fifteen and frequently less, divided into eight or nine classes, the teacher is faced with a condition which makes sound work an impossibility. There is more work in a school of from six to eight grades than one teacher can possibly do well, and the small number of pupils tends to make the work uninteresting and never falls to require the formation of classes of one or two children. In the province of Ontario in 1926 there was 827 schools with 10 pupils or less, 190 with 5 or less, 69 with 3 or less, 28 with 2 or less, 8 with 1 pupil.

### RECORD OF THE EASTERN LOOP

The outstanding features on the eastern loop of the Grand Circuit were the victory of the three year old colt Volomite in the Charter Oak Purse for aged horses, the record breaking miles of Highland Scott in both of which he was driven by Mrs. E. Roland Harriman, and the series of world's records made at Syracuse where the average rate of speed for a meeting was cut from 2.05 3-4 to 2.04 3-4. In the Charter Oak Purse at Hartford, Volomite won a heat in 2.03 1-4, which was within three-quarters of a second of the record for the event. It was made by Grayworthy when he won it in 1921.

The showing made by Highland Scott was as novel as it was attractive. At Hartford he pulled a cart in 2.00 3-4, while at Goshen he made a new track record and also reduced his own record to 1.59 1-4. The first quarter was paced in 30 seconds and each of the other three in 29 3-4 seconds. Over a track like Syracuse it would have been at least a second faster.

The returns for the speed circuit at Syracuse show that thirty-three heats were trotted at an average of 2.05 and twenty-one paced at an average of 2.04 3-4. At this point Betterwin cut the race record for three year old pacers to 2.01 1-2 and Calumet Adam reduced the two year old race record for pacers to 2.05 3-4. Both of these youngsters were bred at Calumet Farm. In the last trot Hazelton and Dewey McKinney reduced the time for a divided heat three heat race to 2.01 3-4, 2.02, 2.02 1-2. Dewey McKinney won the first heat by a few inches and Hazelton the other two. This with the time made by Hazelton in the handicap race at Goshen shows that this son of Lu Princeton is now in top form. At Goshen he was handicapped 100 yards and was timed separately in each mile in 2.01 3-4, 2.02, 2.02 3-4. Hazelton and Dewey McKinney will meet again in the Transylvania at Lexington.

Up to the close of the Syracuse meeting almost all of the two and three year old events were dominated by colts trained by Cox, White, Berry and Palm. All of the winners driven by Cox in the colt stakes were three year olds. Miss Woerner won at Toledo in 2.11, at Detroit against aged horses in 2.05, at Hartford from Contender in the same time, and at Syracuse in 2.06. Sir Guy Mac won at Toledo in 2.07 and was sent to the Orange County Circuit after being defeated by Contender at Kalamazoo. Volomite won the Matron Stake at Toledo, a three year old race at Detroit, the Charter Oak Purse at Hartford in 2.03 1-4, and the Bradley Purse at Goshen. Walter Deas made his first start at Grand Rapids where he won in 2.03 1-2. This was followed by a victory in the Champion Stallion Stake at Cleveland in which Volomite finished second. Another win was scored at Goshen in the Review Purse and one at Syracuse where he cut his record to 2.03, Contender forcing him out.

Berry made his score with the colts from the Hanover Shoe Farm. He won three year old events at Cleveland and Hartford with Miss Hanover and another three year old race at Toledo with Miss Bertha Hanover. The high spot of the trip was touched at Grand Rapids where the two year old filly Hanover's Bertha won in 2.05, 2.04 1-4, making a new world's record. Brother Hanover won two year old races at Detroit and Hartford. At Cleveland, Berry landed the two year old trots with General Hanover in 2.10 1-2 and Hanover's Bertha in 2.07 3-4. General Hanover and Brother Hanover also won at Goshen.

Palm began winning colt stakes at the Lexington June meeting. At that point he won the two year old trot with Betty Ann in 2.11, the three year old pace in 2.08 1-4 with Tony Worthy, and the three year old trot with Contender in 2.05 1-4. The last named also won at Toledo, Cleveland and Kalamazoo where he made a record of 2.04 1-4. The three year old pace was placed to the credit of the Palm outfit by Petroguy at Toledo, Kalamazoo and Detroit. Palm also won the two year old pace at Toledo with Calumet Albert.

White's victories in the colt stakes have been limited to the two year

### HUDSON BAY RAILWAY

MONTREAL, Sept. 13.—The following statement was issued today from the headquarters of the Canadian National Railways: "A good deal of interest has naturally been awakened in Canada and particularly in the west as to when the Hudson Bay Company will commence to function commercially. The construction of the railway which is under the direction of the Canadian National Railways is being pushed as rapidly as possible but it would seriously interfere with the completion of the railway and also give it a bad name if it were opened for traffic prematurely or until such traffic can be handled with reasonable efficiency and satisfaction. Consequently it is hoped that those who have the welfare of the Hudson Bay Railway at heart will understand the situation and realize that although nothing is being left undone to expedite completion construction must be further advanced before commercial operation begins."

There is a very close connection, as the census returns show, between illiteracy of the parents and the proportion of illiteracy of a district and school attendance. The country child born of illiterate parents appears to have only half the chance for an education of his cousin in the city.

From the moment a child enters the country school, his training contemplates entrance to the high school, and from there, he is "headed" for the teaching profession or for the university. He is not effectively trained for the work in life he is to do except it be other than on a farm.
