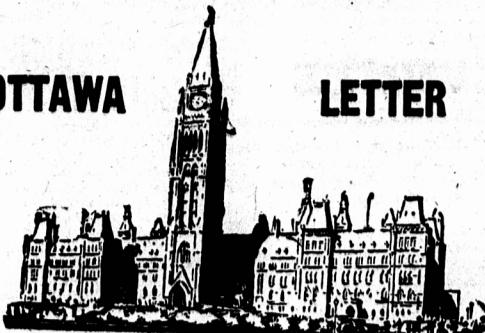

LETTER

Last weekend about one hundred members of the House of Commons accepted the invitation of the Toronto Board of Trade to visit Toronto and be their guests while in the city. Those accepting the invitation came from all parts of Canada and from all the parties represented in the House.

Arrangements were made to go down on the 11.55 p. m. train. This gave the members ample time to go to their hotels after the House closed and get their luggage. The train arrived in Toronto about 8 a. m. The members were taken by bus to the King Edward Hotel, where accommodation had been arranged for us. After breakfast we were taken on a sight seeing trip by bus through Toronto and the surrounding towns.

It was my first extended trip to Toronto and I was struck by how much nature had done for Toronto and how little advantage had been taken of the natural features to make the city more attractive and more pleasant for the inhabitants. Toronto is full of beautiful ravines that run for miles through the city. It would seem that the beauty of these ravines could be enhanced with very little effort. Toronto has many beautiful buildings: two on the campus of the university, and Osgoode Hall are particularly beautiful. The guide who showed us about was more interested in explaining proposed slum clearances—and there is ample room for such clearances—than in showing us points of beauty.

In the afternoon we were shown pictures by the Transport Commission of proposed changes in the traffic system to eliminate the present congestion. The proposals necessitate extended subways and other material changes. The chairman pointed out, however, that due to the shortage of essential construction materials this dream had to be postponed for several years. So we see that cherished projects in other places than Prince Edward Island have to be postponed until building conditions improve.

After we were taken to the top of the Bank of Commerce Building, the highest building in the British Empire, thirty-two stories in all, to view the city. Our guide told us that on clear days one could see Niagara Falls from the top of this building. It was so cloudy when we were there that we could not see the edge of the city or the lake beyond.

His Eminence James Cardinal McGuigan had intimated that he would be glad to see as many of the members as cared to call. About a bus-load accepted the invitation. The Cardinal lives in a very beautiful residence about six miles from the King Edward Hotel. He asked me to convey his best wishes and greetings to all his friends in Prince Edward Island. He made a couple of particular enquiries and was quite pleased when I told him that they were in excellent health. I was delighted to note that the group visiting the Cardinal was about equally made up of Protestants and Catholics.
