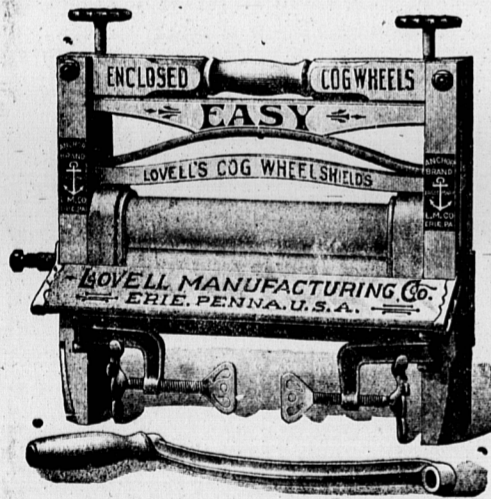

HESTIA TWELVE MILES OUT OF HER COURSE

YARMOUTH, N. S., Nov 3—In view of the attempts which are being made to attach blame for the steamer Hestia accident to the Marine Department, and of the irresponsible statements which are being made by various party newspapers, your correspondent deems it wise to present such information of an indisputable character as he has been able to glean after a careful consultation with several well known master mariners.

Third Officer Stewart, the only surviving navigating officer of the ship, caused to be published yesterday in St John, a statement in which he censures the Marine Department, as to the aids to navigation, and particularly to the gas buoy on the Old Proprietor shoal where the Hestia struck, as being responsible for the disaster which resulted in the loss of thirty-four lives.

There is sound reason to doubt the truth of this assertion. Captain Adelbert McKinnon, one of the best navigators in these parts, was near the scene of the Hestia wreck on Thursday last and found the buoy on Old Proprietor in position. It was day, light at the time, and Captain McKinnon was not able to tell whether or not it was lighted, as a matter of course. He declares, however, that the Government steamer Lansdowne came along immediately after him, cruised around it for half an hour and steamed to the westward, evidently finding the buoy not only properly marked, but also sounding properly and lighted. Capt McKinnon is a strong doubter of the stories circulated to the effect that this buoy had been unlighted for some time.

After the consultation which your correspondent had with prominent master mariners this afternoon accompanied by a joint examination of the chart, there can be no doubt that Captain Newman was about 12 miles out of his course. The regular procedure for masters of steamers coming from Britain and bound for St John is to make Cape Sable and then steer to the Lurcher Lightship off Yarmouth, from which they steer to a point off Northwest Ledge where the Hestia was lost.

Third Officers Stewart's statement that the ship was steering the middle course, and after sounding had found a depth of 100 fathoms cannot be true. That depth could only be found off Northwest Ledge where the Hestia would have been had she been on her proper course. Had she been there she would have been 12 miles from Old Proprietor.

The theory of experienced master mariners here is that Captain Newman did not sight any of the leading navigation aids after making Cape Sable. It seems almost certain that he never sighted the Lurcher Lightship, but entered the Bay of Fundy on more or less of a venture. The heavy northeast wind and eb tide which prevailed before the wreck carried him over towards Grand Manan and to the scene of the disaster.

VAST OUTLAY ON NEW YORK RAILROAD

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—President W. C. Brown, of the New York Central and Hudson River railroad, announced today that the management had entered upon a campaign of extraordinary expenditures to meet the extraordinary traffic demands. The company had placed contracts in the last few days, he said, for \$25,000,000 worth of new locomotives, passenger and freight cars and intends to spend \$60,000,000 more, making \$85,000,000 in all, in reducing grades, straightening curves and laying new rails, exclusive of \$50,000,000 terminal improvements in New York City.

"These expenditures," he said, "are absolutely necessary to meet the demands of business. The traffic records for the months of September and October up to date have exceeded anything in the company's history. The previous high water mark was for the first three-quarters of 1907, just before the panic.

"Every available car and engine on the entire system is in service. My latest report shows that 94 per cent of our freight cars are in use. The remaining six per cent are in repair shops, with men working as fast as possible to get them out. These figures are unprecedented. We could have ten per cent greater business today if we had the equipment to handle it."

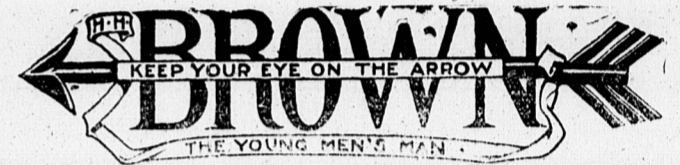

KING ALFONSO VERY INDIGNANT

PARIS, Nov 2.—A special despatch from Madrid to the Journal gives an interview with King Alfonso, who expressed himself bitterly on the Ferrer demonstrations abroad. He said he understood the attitude of the masses, who were always ready to take sides with what they considered right, but he continued:

"That intellectual servants, who do not dare to announce a discovery before it is verified a hundred times by experiments, should protest without inquiry against a judgment conformable with laws they are ignorant of, and against the guaranteed honor of Spanish soldiers, I cannot understand. To listen to certain Frenchmen, one would think we were savages and living in the time of the Inquest, instead of a constitutional monarchy, so constitutional indeed that I have not even the initiative of the right of pardon."

CARDINAL FROWNS ON SUFFRAGETTES

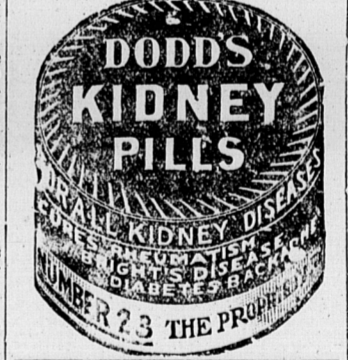
NEW YORK, November 2.—Cardinal Gibbons, in a letter to the National League for the Civic Education of women, at an anti suffragette organization strongly expresses his sympathy for their cause. Cardinal Gibbons' letter which was made public to-day says:—

"I regret greatly that I cannot attend the meeting called for November 1. Although my many duties will not allow me to be present at your meeting, I beg to assure you that I am most heartily in sympathy with the aim of your league and approve most strongly the stand it has taken opposing woman suffrage, which, if realized would be the death-blow of domestic life and happiness."

INCREASE IN P. E. I. DAIRY PRODUCTS.

ST JOHN, Nov 3.—Harvey Mitchell of the dairy division, Ottawa, was in the city yesterday, registered at the Royal. He has just come from Charlottetown and reports that there will be a large increase in dairy products from P. E. Island this year. Nov Scotia has gone in more for the establishment of private dairies and although New Brunswick has co-operated dairies, there is little if any increase to be noted in the output this year.

Mr Mitchell says that all crops have been excellent on P. E. Island. The farmers there saved their hay before the wet weather set in. He saw a good deal of grain in the stock, however, and fields practically under water. Potatoes are a good crop but are rotting as the farmers cannot get them out of the ground.
